ALL SET FOR INTERSCHOLASTIC

MONTANA LOSES DUAL MEET

AGGIES DEFEAT GRIZZLIES SATURDAY AFTER ELEVEN MONTANA VICTORIES

Plummer, Bachman and Benton Set New Records In Meet.

The University track team was defeated in the annual meet with Montana State College last Saturday at Bozeman, 67-50. This is the first time in 12 years that the collegiate track honors have been won by the Bozeman institution. Three state records were broken and one tied during the afternoon. Backman, Montana State's distance runner, set a new record in the two-mile run, his time being 10:24 2-5; Plummer, who heaved the javelin for the Grizzlies, sent the wand quivering for 158 feet, 1 inch, three feet better than the record; Benton, of the Aggies, set a new broad jump record of 21 feet 9 1-2 inches. Andrus, speed demon of the Grizzlies, was timed at 10 flat in the 100 yard dash.

It was an off day for the Grizzlies. Shaffer and Porter, of the University, who have vaulted consistently this spring at 11 feet 6 inches, failed to clear the bar at 10 feet, 9 inches. In the javelin throw, Maudlin, of the University, failed to place second, on account of a slip on the wet grass at the final heave. A wind blowing over the field blew down a hurdle, just as Plummer, university hurdler, finished second in the event. The college judges disqualified him, giving the minor place to Sales of the Aggie team, who lagged several yards behind.

In the 220 yard dash Cogswell, of the college, was given first place over Andrus, of the university. This event was hotly contested, the two running neck and neck to the tape. The decision on this race was unsatisfactory to the university men, as Andrus appeared to have hit the tape a foot ahead of the college speeder.

100-yard dash—Andrus, university, first; Rutherford, university, second. Time, 10 flat.

Pole vault—Powers and Shoebottom, college, tied for first. Height, 10 feet, 9 inches. Porter and Shaffer were unable to get started in this event.

Mile run—Bachman, college, first; Bunney, college, second. Time, 4:50 1-5.

Shot-put—Blumenthal, college, first; Axtell, university, second; distance, 43 feet, 4 1-2 inches.

220-yard dash—Cogswell, college, first; Andrus, university, second. Time, 23 2-5 seconds.

High jump—Cottam, college, first; Rule, university, second; 5 feet, 4 inches.

Discus—Shaffer, university, first; Maudlin, university, second; distance, 126 feet, 9 inches.

440-yard run—Egan, university, first; Cogswell, college, second. Time, 53 flat.

Two-mile run—Bachman, college, first; Adams, college, second. Time, 10:24 4-5. (New record.)

TOM GAC GOWAN RETURNS FROM PENN RELAY RACES

Cloudburst Spoils Meet, First Six Place In Discus.

Tom MacGowan, Montana's veteran discus hurler, returned from the Penn relay races in Philadelphia and met the Grizzly track team in Bozeman. There were 65 men entered in the discus throw.

The day before the meet MacGowan threw the discus 144 feet in practice, but the following day a cloudburst occurred after six men had thrown. It was impossible to whirl in the muddy ring and the first six men were the only ones to place.

This was the last time MacGowan will represent the university, having given four years of service to the school. He will continue his training and next year will try out for the Olympics.

GRIZZLY TRACK MEN MEET IDAHO SATURDAY

The Gem State Vandals will meet the Montana Grizzlies on the home field next Saturday, the day following the interscholastic meet.

Idaho defeated Montana for the last time in 1916. Since then Montana has been on top. Idaho was defeated by W. S. C. last Friday, in the first conference dual meet of the season, 98 1-5 to 32 4-5. W. S. C. won 12 first places. Idaho won first and the relay. Excellent time was made in the two-mile run, the quarter, and the relay, making it in 3:31 4-5.

Captain Egan will have his work cut out for him in the quarter, as Casebolt, of Idaho, ran it in 50 6-10 seconds. This meet will furnish the approximate strength of the university against the Washington State college team, which will be here May 19 to meet the Grizzly team.

NO CO-ED TENNIS PLANNED.

No plans for inter-organization tennis among the girls have been made because of the bad condition of the courts, according to Miss Rhoda Baxter. There are only two courts on the campus, those in back of Craig hall, and they are not rolled well or marked off.

GRIZZLIES TAKE TWO FROM MISSIONARIES

Start Western Trip Tonight; To Play W. S. C., Idaho and Gonzaga.

The Grizzly ball club took a hotly-contested series from the Whitman Missionaries by winning the first two games by scores of 5 to 4 and 9 to 8. Whitman took the third game, Ralph Knudsen, elongated Missionary hurler, shutting out the Varsity 5 to 0 in the final game Saturday.

Coach Spencer's ball-tossers were forced to go 10 innings to win the second game of the series. In the tenth, Ken Simmon's slashing triple to deep right center scored Biscuits Driscoll, who had singled, with the winning run of a desperately-fought see-saw contest.

Captain Bill Johnson was on the mound for the Varsity and was nicked for six runs and eight hits in the first four innings. After the fourth he settled down and twirled excellent ball. The Missionaries shoved five runs across the plate on five hits and two bad errors, in the fourth. The Grizzlies secured 13 hits off the delivery of Babe Ward, who was saved several times by sensational running catches by Outfielders Hall and Matsuno.

The Grizzlies staged their biggest rally in the fourth. Simmons led off with a single, Dixon walked, Baird got a single to center, scoring Simmons; Burtress fanned, Johnson walked, filling the bases again; W. Driscoll whiffed, J. Driscoll singled, scoring Dixon. Tanner drove out a long fly to center which Tsudo muffed after a long run, and Baird, Johnson and J. Driscoll all crossed the rubber. Weideman was robbed of a hit by Hall's sensational running catch in left, Montana counted again twice in the fifth, Simmons singled again and went to third on Dixon's double; Simmons scored on a squeeze play when Burtress layed down a perfect bunt. Dixon dented the rubber when Johnson bounced a single off Clinton Ward's ankles. Montana's eighth run came in the seventh on successive doubles by Burtress and Johnson.

Whitman tied the score in the eighth. Yenny tripled and scored on Garrett's single. Garrett immediately stole second and scored on Clayton Ward's double down first base line. This left the score eight apiece. Neither team scored in the ninth and in the tenth Simmons' triple spelled defeat for Whitman.

BITTER ROOT ATHLETES STAGE FAST TRACK MEET

Hill Wins 50-Yard Dash Only; Millam Sets New Century Mark.

Hamilton, with a well balanced team of performers won the 1923 Ravalli county track meet held at Hamilton May 4. All the dope was upset as Stevensville was picked to win the meet with Hill, Ragen and Drew as their mainstays.

Hill, from Stevensville, the man that placed first in the 50, 100 and 220-yard dashes at the state meet last year won only one first the whole day. He won the 50-yard dash, but was pushed by Millam, who won the century with Hill second. Millam established a new county record for the century and tied the state record of 10 2-5 seconds.

In the 220-yard dash, Millam and Hagen, of Stevensville, tied for first and Peterson, of Hamilton, tied Hill for second.

TO GIVE "THE MOLLUSC" FOR VISITORS FRIDAY

"The Mollusc," by Hubert Henry Davies will be given for the interscholastic visitors at the high school auditorium next Friday night, taking the place of the revival of J. M. Barrie's "Alice Sit-by-the-Fire," which was first selected for this performance. This decision was made after the presentation of "The Mollusc" last Thursday night.

"The Mollusc" was originally produced by members of the class in English 62. The first performance was given for the Women's clubs of Missoula. The Masquers then took over the play and gave a performance for students and townspeople last Thursday charging 50 cents, for the expenses of producing it. The interscholastic committee decided to substitute this for the revival of "Alice Sit-by-the-Fire," as it was considered more suitable for this performance.

The play is a three act comedy first presented in England by Sir Charles Wyndham and later in America with John Drew.

It is a high class drawingroom comedy exposing the foibles of an educated class in England and incidentally the foibles of all human nature.

Veterans and R. O. T. C. Units Pass In Review; Campus Decorated.

Three hundred and seventy-three contestants, representing 77 Montana high schools, will compete in the twentieth annual Interscholastic Track Meet being held Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday of this week. Extensive plans for entertainment of visitors are under way, and special decorations will trim the campus, fraternity houses and downtown streets.

Banners, flags and streamers made by the home economics department will decorate the campus. A large arch at the University Avenue entrance, bearing the name Montana, welcomes the visitors. Ralph Fields, who is in charge of decorations for fraternities, has distributed a large M to each of the fraternities, which, along with streamers, will decorate the front of the houses.

A luncheon in honor of visiting teachers and coaches as well as the University faculty will be given by the home economics department in the domestic science rooms Friday noon.

Craig Hall will house ten girl contestants as well as 16 guests of the individual residents. The cafeteria will be open to contestants.

Special meetings authorized by Dr. J. P. Rowe are as follows: Wednesday at 9:30, all athletic contestants will meet at the new gymnasium, and at 10:30 the Montana High School Association will meet in Main hall. Friday at 9 o'clock the Montana High School Debating League meets in room 206 of the Library.

Thursday afternoon, at 3:45, the cadet corps of the University and the company of ex-service men will pass in review.

The men in khaki will be reviewed by Governor Joseph M. Dixon, Adjutant General Charles Sheridan, Attorney General Wellington D. Rankin, Major A. F. Williams, commanding officer of the 163rd Infantry, Montana Guard; John W. Mahan, state commander of the Disabled American Veterans; C. T. Busha, sub-district manager of the Veterans' bureau; W. R. Van Orden, department commander of the Spanish American War Veterans, and President C. H. Clapp of the University.

Major H. L. Gordon, officer in charge of R. O. T. C. affairs, will arrive in Missoula Wednesday morning and is expected to stay for the review.

Missoula Post No. 27 of the American Legion will present the corps with a silk flag. Eloise Baird has been chosen as sponsor for the corps and will uncover the flag. The veterans' company will receive the colors and will be the color company.

All students who are taking military courses in the University have been ordered to report for drill by President Clapp. The student companies will wear their regular uniforms for the parade. Trench helmets have arrived and the ex-service men will be fitted with them. They will parade with fixed bayonets.

PUNK STUFF.

Very unsatisfactory were some of the decisions given at Bozeman Saturday at the University-College meet. Eye-witnesses say that in many cases the University men suffered from prejudiced decisions.

This is no alibi. We can take a beating as well as a victory. But remarks were current in the Aggie crowd, to the effect that the College was "getting even" for the touchdown in the last second of play in the big game last fall, when the Aggies were forced to defeat.

Is this good spirit? Are future contests to be decided merely by the location of the event? Is the University to win in Missoula, and the College to win in Bozeman, merely because it is the "home-town?"

A REMINDER.

The interscholastic meet has been successfully conducted for nineteen years. In that rather long stretch of time not on accident has occurred which has been disastrous to the contestants or the onlookers. However, at Bozeman an incident happened which may be beneficial to bear in mind.

An Aggie student, W. J. O'Leary, was pierced by a javelin which had traveled a distance of 160 feet. The young man's life was saved by a belt buckle.

The interscholastic meet this year will be, no doubt, conducted as in the past years. The athletic field will be crowded with officials, contestants and others. This congestion, perhaps, cannot be remedied. Those who are on the field should remember the results of a misdirected discus, shot or javelin.

READ THIS.

It is the old, old story again. One man met the returning Grizzly track team Sunday morning. Perhaps it is the virus of spring. Perhaps it is laziness. Nevertheless, something is wrong. Are the students only capable of supporting a winning team? If this is so, it is time that athletics be stopped at the University.

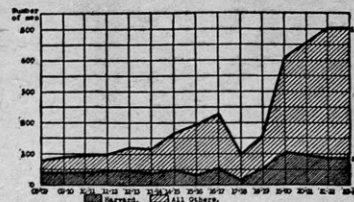

HIGH SCHOOL EDITORS **MEET HERE THIS WEEK**

Will Attempt to Form State Exchange For Next Year.

Thirty to fifty delegates, representing a large number of the thirty-three high school papers in the state, are expected to attend the annual meeting of the High School Editorial Association this year. The meeting will be held Thursday and Friday of this week at 10 a. m. It is held under the auspices of the university in connection with the interscholastic track meet.

This association was organized in 1915 and a meeting was held annually during the interscholastic track meet week until the breaking out of the world's war, when it was suspended for a period of three years. It was revived in 1921.

The association is attempting to form a high school exchange so that the different high schools can keep in touch with each other.

Discussion of Advertising—By the delegates of the Mountaineer and the Centralite, papers of Butte high and Butte Central respectively.

Discussion of Circulation—By the delegate from Gallatin high school.

Friday's Program.

Discussion of the School of Journalism—By Helen Newman and William Cogswell, representatives of the Montana School of Journalism, at the national convention of Theta Sigma Phi and Sigma Delta Chi, respectively.

Discussion Upon the Gathering of Local News—By the delegate of the Helena Nugget, Helena high school paper.

Discussion of the News Exchange—By the delegate of the Billings Kyote.

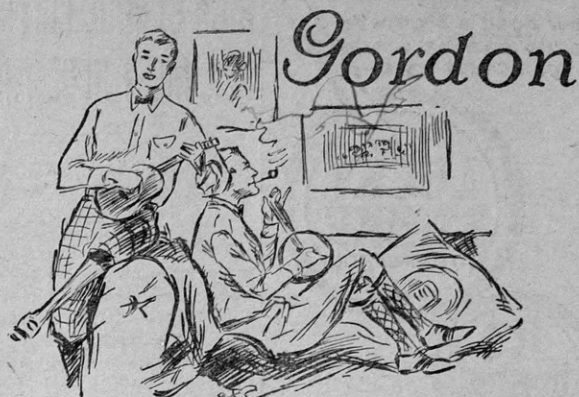
