# Minutes from the February 16, 1922 meeting of the University of Montana faculty

State University of Montana (Missoula, Mont.). Faculty

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February 16, 1922.

- The postponed regular monthly meeting of the faculty was held at 4:10 P. M., on the call of President Clapp who presided. Chancellor Elliott was present.

The following members came in after the meeting was called to order: Bozorth, Kirkwood, Mollet, Owen, Smith, Suchy, Swenson.

The following members were accounted for: Corbin, Lansing, Pope, Underwood.

The minutes of the meeting of January 12, 1922, were approved.

- The President stated that the announcement concerning Special Exem penalty for absences preceeding and following a holiday, made at the meeting of the faculty held January 12th (paragraph 4-b), was before or in the nature of a recommendation instead of a ruling. Moved by Store. Merriam, seconded by Coon that the recommendation be approved. The motion was unanimously adopted, the ruling as approved being as follows: Students absent from classes, including regularly scheduled final examinations, two days immediately preceeding or following a holiday or vacation will not receive credit in those courses from which they were absent until they pass a special examination, for which a fee of \$1.00 per quarter credit will be charged; exceptions to this ruling may be made by the President only.
- The following recommendation was received from the Deans' Conference:
  - No student shall be registered for credit in a course foliate after twenty-five per cent of the classroom exercises registrationer have been held. have been held.
  - A student regularly registered in a course who has not (for any reason legitimate or otherwise) been in attendance seventy-five per cent of the regular classroom exercises as shown by the official records in the Registrar's office, shall be assigned an 'F' in that course by the Registrar.

Exceptions to these sections can be made only by the Deans' Conference on recommendation of the instructor and of the Chairman of the Department concerned. (Such exceptions will not be considered later than two weeks after the quarter has closed.) The above rules to become effective at the beginning of the Spring Quarter.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the recommendation. After discussion, a motion was made by Kirkwood and seconded by Skeels to lay the recommendation over until the next meeting of the faculty. The motion to lay over was unanimously adopted.

Recommendation that Ronald S. Kain and Robert MacHatton le allowed three credits for the course in Laboratory in Journalism 41a in place of the two credits for which they registered. Their instructor, Mr. Stone, recommends this due to the fact that the credits for this course were incorrectly stated on the schedule of exercises and that the students should therefore have registered for three credits in place of two.

A motion to adopt the recommendation was carried.

- 7. In announcement was made by Mr. Simes, a member of the Board of Directors of the Students' Bookstore, that instructors are asked to make, at an early date, requests for books for the spring quarter direct to the manager of the bookstore.
- The Fresident read a list of the names of the members of the faculty whose reports of unsatisfactory scholarship called for at 9:00 A. M., February 6th, were filed after the date called for.
- 9. The Committee on Admission and Registration recommended the following list of candidates for degrees and certificates to be granted at the end of the winter quarter, 1922, with the provision that they complete all requirements in accordance with the rules of the faculty:

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

The motion to adopt the recommendation was unanimously carried.

10. The Curriculum Committee of the College of Arts and Sci- College nces recommended the following proposed ruling:

"Students entering with one unit of French or Spanish enter lib of the same language; with two units, 13b of the same language; with three units, 15a of the same language; and, with four units, 15b of the same language." A motion to adopt the recommendation was made by Coon, seconded, and unanimously carried.



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11. The Curriculum Committee of the College of Arts and Sci ences recommended to the faculty that "since the department of (control for allowed Poreign Languages has been reorganized so that a student may major in French or in Spanish and after next year possibly in Latin and Greek not more than 90 credits in the department of Foreign Languages may be counted toward the B.A. degree. The Committee, in presenting this particular number as a maximum, is doing this in order to get it before the faculty for action but is not insisting that the number 90 be the number approved as a maximum." On motion, action on this recommendation was postponed to the next faculty meeting.

13. In re Phillip White: Professor Kirkwood, his adviser, asked the faculty to grant a petition from Mr. White to substitute three quarter credits in other subjects for his remaining restricted elective in Literature or Philosophy.

The petition was approved by his adviser and disapproved by the Committee on Admission and Registration. On motion of Con the petition was granted by the faculty.

Chancellor Elliott addressed the Faculty stating, among 13. things, that

Problems - as set forth by Chancellor Elliot

- a. The Curriculum should be revised so as to eliminate many elementary courses now offered.
- b. The serious financial situation of the state was very likely to affect plans for the University institutions.
- c. A limitation on number of students for the next academic year might be necessary.
- d. Service reports are indispensable for the Chancellor office and members of the staff should prepare them with care and include all their activities and duties.
- There being no further business before the Faculty, the meeting adjourned.
