The complex issues of hunger, food security and poverty will be discussed during the 17th annual Mansfield Conference Nov. 19-21 at The University of Montana. "Feeding the Hungry: Food Security and Genetic Technology" will tackle issues such as sustainable food systems and genetically modified foods.

Featured speakers will be Robert Paarlberg, an associate at Harvard University's Weatherhead Center for International Affairs and an expert on international agriculture and environmental policy; Frances Moore Lappe, a Massachusetts Institute of Technology visiting scholar and author of "Diet for a Small Planet," which has sold more than 3 million copies worldwide; and William Harrop, director of the American Academy of Diplomacy and a former ambassador to Israel, Kenya, Zaire, Seychelles and Guinea.

The conference will offer a performance by San Francisco's Lily Cai Chinese Dance Co., a troupe that melds ancient Chinese forms with modern dance. The company offers performances ranging from the spectacular court dances of Chinese dynasties to contemporary works fusing Asian dance with ballet. This is all complemented by dazzling costumes, original music and multimedia designs. The show is sponsored by the Mansfield Center, UM Productions and the School of Fine Arts.

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All conference events are free and open to the public except the Tuesday, Nov. 21, dance performance by Lily Cai, which will charge \$5 a ticket and is free to children under age 15. All proceeds will benefit the Missoula Food Bank and Garden City Harvest. Tickets are available by calling all TIC-IT-E-Z outlets, The Good Food Store and Rockin Rudy's. In addition, a silent auction of artwork by Missoula schoolchildren will benefit the Poverello Center.

The Mansfield Conference is organized annually by UM's Maureen and Mike

Mansfield Center, which strives to create a clearer understanding of our interdependent world in which three out of every five people are Asian. Other major event sponsors are the Maureen
