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The meeting was called to order by President Bob Sorenson at 7:15 p.m. in the Montana Rooms of the University Center.

Minutes were approved as presented.

President Sorenson dispensed with all business to enable the discussion of the budgets.

BLAKE JOHNSON MOVED THAT THE PROGRAM COUNCIL BYLAWS BE CHANGED REGARDING SALARIES OF AREA COORDINATORS TO READ \$35.00 INSTEAD OF \$50.00. GILBERT SECONDED THE MOTION. JOHNSON MOVED TO TABLE THIS CHANGE FOR ONE WEEK AS IT INVOLVED CHANGING BYLAWS. GILBERT SECONDED THE MOTION. THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

BERVEN MOVED TO REFER THE MATTER OF BUDGETING TO A COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE. GILBERT SECONDED THE MOTION. THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY. PRESIDENT SORENSON APPOINTED CENTRAL BOARD AS A COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE, WITH HIMSELF AS CHAIRMAN, OPERATING UNDER CURRENT CENTRAL BOARD RULES AND PROCEDURE. BERVEN MOVED THAT THE COMMITTEE, THE CHAIRMAN AND THE RULES OF PROCEDURE BE APPROVED AS PROPOSED. SORENSON SECONDED THE MOTION. BERVEN MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD RECESS NOW AND RECONVENE UPON THE ADJOURNMENT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE. HANSON SECONDED THE MOTION. THE CHAIR ANNOUNCED THAT THE COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE WILL MEET IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE RECESS OF CENTRAL BOARD. THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

COMMITTEE MEETING: President Sorenson announced that all decisions this night and by this committee are tentative and that final decisions would be voted upon at the next meeting.

ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET: Johnson reported that the Administrative budget suggestion was \$8000.00. He said the arithmetic average of administrative expenses to total revenue from student fees is 4.2% for the years between 1959-60 and 1971-72 academic year. Although there is little measurable relationship between total revenue and administrative expenses, the ratio of administrative expenses to total revenue is reliable. BERVEN MOVED THAT \$8000.00 BE ALLOCATED TO ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET FOR THE 1972-73 YEAR. THE MOTION WAS SECONDED BY SWENSON. THE QUESTION WAS CALLED. THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY AS \$8000.00 FOR THE ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET.

BOOKKEEPING: Johnson said the suggested budget for Bookkeeping was \$8000.00. The University provides accounting services. It hires a student auditor to work with only student group accounts 900 series. ANDERSON MOVED \$8000.00 BE ALLOCATED TO BOOKKEEPING. GILBERT SECONDED THE MOTION. MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$8000.00 TO BOOKKEEPING PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

SPECIAL ALLOCATIONS BUDGET: Johnson said budget suggestion for Special Allocations is \$10,000.00. Out of this amount, \$4,000.00 would be set aside for a legislative program, \$2,000.00 for a possible Consumer Affairs Board, \$5,000 last year was set aside for Legal Services, and possibly some of this could be asked by Selective Service if a program is required for the academic year. SORENSON MOVED \$10,000.00 BE ALLOCATED TO SPECIAL ALLOCATIONS FOR THE 1972-73 YEAR. THE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$10,000.00 TO SPECIAL ALLOCATIONS AND ANY SURPLUS FUNDS BE ADDED TO THIS FUND AND USED FOR THE 1972-73 YEAR PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

BERVEN MOVED TO SET ASIDE \$13,000.00 IN A SPECIAL RESERVE FUND TO BE USED FOR VARSITY ATHLETICS OR IN ANY OTHER USEFUL WAY. HANSON SECONDED THE MOTION. PRESIDENT SORENSON YIELDED THE GAVEL TO VICE PRESIDENT COLLIER. Sorenson reminded the board that the athletic budget had been frozen until the work-study controversy was cleared up and that Berven's motion was out of order. BERVEN WITHDREW HIS MOTION. HANSON WITHDREW HIS SECOND TO THE MOTION.

FACILITIES USAGE: Johnson said that the budget suggestion for Facilities Usage was \$3,000.00. SORENSON MOVED THAT \$3,000.00 BE ALLOCATED TO FACILITIES USAGE. THE MOTION WAS SECONDED BY HANSON. Johnson said the allocation for Facilities Usage covered the cost of the Grizzly Swimming Pool for the 1972-73 year. THE MOTION PASSED WITH THE MAJORITY IN FAVOR.

THE MONTANA KAIMIN: The budget request from this group for the 1972-73 year was \$39,800.00. Johnson said that the budget suggestion by the ASUM officers was \$31,664.00 for the Kaimin. The cuts mainly are in the area of paid new staff members. They felt that this was a dangerous precedent to drastically increase the bureaucratic structure of ASUM in this area. JOHNSON MOVED THAT \$31,664.00 BE ALLOCATED TO THE MONTANA KAIMIN FOR THE 1972-73 YEAR. THE MOTION WAS SECONDED BY MADISON. Bill Blake said that the photographers salaries could not be cut because now they are working from 8 to 10 hours a day and they need at least two photographers to do all the work that is required. Berven said that the reporters could be trained to be photographers. Bill Blake said that the position of the advertising manager was a full time job and that this position could not be cut in salary. He said that he himself did not have the time to take care of the business office side of the Kaimin, the print shop business and to supervise the ad salesmen. The advertisement manager would be hired to help do some of this work. Sorenson said that two secretaries could help solve some of the problems for the business manager. Sorenson also went on to say that he didn't feel the Kaimin needed two secretaries and an ad salesman, and if they did, something was wrong with his coordination. "Why pay students great amounts of money? Are you paying them to learn? Fifteen years from now you'll be paying out \$10,000.00 for hired help and they'll be signing their own pay checks." Sorenson asked what the difference was between the distribution manager and the circulation manager. Blake said that the distribution manager picked the Kaimin's up from the Print Shop and delivered them. The circulation manager sends them out in the mail. Sorenson said that the secretaries could probably mail them and there would be no need for a circulation manager. Blake said that the mailing was done in a different part of the building away from the secretaries and they would not be able to do this. Johnson said that the cuts in the budget for the Montana Kaimin would be as follows:

Clay said that the reason the telephone and telegraph amount had been cut is that he thought the Kaimin could get a hot-line and this would save in the cost of in-state calls. Bill Blake said that last year the Kaimin spent \$1020.00 in telephone bills, but this year they have only spent \$759.44. Blake said that the reason for asking for \$1000.00 in travel would be to cover the costs of the reporters reporting on sports games out of town, trips to the constitutional convention for reporters, sending the advisor to a national convention of advertising publishers. Johnson felt that rentals (associated press) should be \$600.00. Clay questioned the cut of \$100.00. B. Blake said that syndicated cartoon and columns should not be cut from \$750.00 to \$500.00. He said that this included columns by professionals that were pertinent to students, college press service and what's happening at other schools and not news. Johnson said that equipment would be cut \$300.00. Binding was cut because Johnson felt that most of the binding goes to the library. Johnson said that photography could be cut to \$500.00 and this would cover the costs of paper, film and chemical. Hanson asked how much the Kaimin spent this year for photography supplies. Blake said around \$500.00. Hanson questioned the increase of \$250.00 for photography from this year. Blake said that they re-established the dark room at the beginning of the year and this extra cost would help cover the expenses of the chemicals and paper. Association dues were cut to \$50 and this would be spent on the State Press Association. Johnson felt the Inter-mountain Press Association was not needed. Bookkeeping was cut entirely out because Johnson said that ASUM already pays for the bookkeeping services from the University. B. Blake suggested that the amount for insurance remain as requested because the Kaimin had a camera stolen this year and the insurance is still pending on this matter. This insurance would also include damages on equipment. Owens asked if the Kaimin was covered with liability. Blake said that they were not. Johnson said that the registration fees should be cut entirely. Johnson said that special projects should be cut \$200.00. B. Blake said that the \$600.00 for special projects was for camera work for special editions. Nelson said that he would like to see a professional paper. Blake said that the salaries should stay the same. Duggan said that he thought the Kaimin had put together a pretty good budget and that Central Board should accept it as it stands. Owens asked if the Kaimin had students who helped the editor. Blake said yes and only for credit. Hanson said that there are many other groups that need money and if the Kaimin could get along with less staff. Blake said no, and that the Kaimin would have to increase its staff sometime in the future. KILOKOTRONES MOVED TO AMEND THE MAIN MOTION TO \$38,300.00. THE AMENDMENT FAILED FOR LACK OF A SECOND. NELSON MOVED TO AMEND THE MOTION TO READ \$34,900.00 FOR THE KAIMIN. THE MOTION WAS SECONDED BY BERVEN. Nelson said he felt the cuts in the Kaimin budget should follow as such: \$600 from the artist's salary, \$400 from the copy readers salary, \$100 from binding, \$200 from mats and services, \$100 from office supplies, \$500 from telephone, \$250 from postage, \$750 from travel, \$750 from syndicated press, \$500 from equipment, \$600 from special projects, and \$150 from registration and fees. The intent of Nelson's amendment was to keep salaries basically the same as they previously had been asked for. Blake said that the Kaimin budget was an honest one and he would appreciate the amount be given as requested. SORENSON MOVED THE PREVIOUS QUESTION. BRIAN FLAHERTY SECONDED. MOTION TO MOVE PREVIOUS QUESTION CARRIED WITH ALL IN

FAVOR EXCEPT JOHNSON, WITH SORENSEN ABSTAINING. VOTE WAS TAKEN ON AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$34,900 TO THE KAIMIN. AMENDMENT DEFEATED WITH MAJORITY OPPOSED. JOHNSON MOVED AMENDMENT TO MAIN MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$32,344 TO THE KAIMIN. BERVEN SECONDED. DIVISION OF THE HOUSE. AMENDED MOTION PASSED TO ALLOCATE \$32,344 TO THE KAIMIN. WITH 8 NO AND 14 YES. GILBERT MOVED AMENDMENT TO THE MAIN MOTION TO ADD \$600 TO THIS AMOUNT FOR AN ARTIST. AMENDED MOTION DIED FOR LACK OF A SECOND. KOLOKOTRONES MOVED TO AMEND THE MAIN MOTION TO ALLOCATE THE FULL AMOUNT OF REQUEST, \$39,800. BERVEN SECONDED. QUESTION CALLED. DIVISION OF HOUSE. ROLL CALL VOTE: 5 YES AND 17 NO. AMENDMENT DEFEATED. GILBERT MOVED AMENDMENT TO THE MAIN MOTION TO ADD \$55.00 FOR ART AND \$600.00 FOR SPECIAL PROJECTS. NELSON SECONDED. A STANDING VOTE OF 12-11 DEFEATED THE AMENDMENT. JOHNSON MOVED AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$32,344 TO THE KAIMIN. IT WAS SECONDED BY RAGEN. QUESTION CALLED. AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$32,344 TO THE KAIMIN PASSED WITH 12 YES AND 8 OPPOSED AND 2 ABSTAINING.

CLAY COLLIER YIELDED THE GAVEL TO BLAKE JOHNSON.

THE BOOK: Budget request for The Book was \$8,705.00. Johnson said the budget suggestion for The Book was \$0, with the understanding that if a new approach was conceived, the money could come out of the Special Allocation Fund. NELSON MOVED THE BOOK BE ALLOCATED \$0 AT THIS TIME. SORENSEN SECONDED. Thornton said that \$3,000 should not be under miscellaneous expenditures, but printing. SORENSEN MOVED AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$0 BECAUSE THE PRESENT STAFF SEEMS UNABLE TO COME UP WITH INFORMATIVE CHANGES NEEDED WITHIN THE FORMAT, AND THAT THE BOOK MAY COME BACK TO CENTRAL BOARD FOR ALLOCATION IF THE BOOK IS ABLE TO MAKE THE NEEDED CHANGES. STEVE SORENSEN SECONDED. Sue Howlett, Editor of The Book said it was unfair not to allocate money to The Book since it was her fault for not revising it over the summer. Hanson said it was unfair to allocate money to a blind cause. QUESTION WAS CALLED. VOTE ON THE AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$0 TO THE BOOK UNTIL IT COMES UP WITH A NEW APPROACH WAS DEFEATED WITH THE MAJORITY OPPOSED. BRIAN FLAHERTY MOVED THAT THE \$8,705.00 BUDGET REQUEST FOR THE BOOK BE FROZEN UNTIL THE BOARD FINDS OUT WHAT THEY ARE GOING TO DO WITH THE BOOK. MOTION DIED FOR LACK OF SECOND. BRIAN FLAHERTY MOVED TO TABLE THE BUDGET REQUEST FOR THE BOOK FOR ONE WEEK. RIDGEWAY SECONDED. MOTION FAILED WITH A STANDING VOTE OF 8 YES AND 14 NO. OWENS MOVED A SUBSTITUTE MOTION THAT THE BOOK BE ALLOCATED \$4,780.00 TO BE SPENT FOR: PRINTING COSTS \$300; ADVERTISING AND PUBLICITY \$25.00; OFFICE SUPPLIES \$100; EDITOR'S SALARY \$900; BUSINESS MANAGER'S SALARY \$405; CLERICAL SERVICES \$3,500; WITH A RECOMMENDATION THAT A MORE EFFECTIVE FORMAT BE ESTABLISHED AND IF NECESSARY, THE BOOK SHALL RETURN TO CENTRAL BOARD FOR ADDITIONAL STAFF SALARIES. BERVEN SECONDED. QUESTION CALLED. SUBSTITUTE MOTION WAS DEFEATED WITH MAJORITY OPPOSED. STANDING VOTE ON MAIN MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$0 TO THE BOOK WITH THE STIPULATION THAT IF THE BOOK MAKES NECESSARY CHANGES THEY MAY COME BACK TO CENTRAL BOARD FOR ALLOCATION. MOTION CARRIED WITH MAJORITY IN FAVOR. BLAKE JOHNSON YIELDED THE GAVEL TO SORENSEN.

THE GARRET: Budget request for The Garret is \$3500. Suggested budget is \$2700.00 as this was a new approach, and we feel that this would be worth trying. The cuts are in the area of paid staff. JOHNSON MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$2700 TO THE GARRET. OWENS SECONDED. PAT FLAHERTY MOVED AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$0 TO THE GARRET. SORENSEN SECONDED. Brian Flaherty said that The Garret's sales were mostly to other universities. Pat Flaherty thought we could use the Kaimin to edit the University's literature and dispose of The Garret. Collier said we would be doing ourselves an injustice to stop the Garret from publishing the good works of the students on this campus. He thought by cutting salaries, The Garret could still operate. QUESTION CALLED ON AMENDMENT. STANDING VOTE WITH 9 YES AND 11 OPPOSED DEFEATED THE AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$0 TO THE GARRET. A STANDING VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MAIN MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$2700 TO THE GARRET CARRIED WITH 12 YES AND 8 NO.

PROGRAM COUNCIL: The budget request for Program Council is \$51,552.55. The suggested budget is \$45,000.00. COLLIER MOVED TO ALLOCATE PROGRAM COUNCIL \$45,000. MADISON SECONDED. Jim Scott said they turned in a very exacting budget. Sorenson said that PC cannot see ahead of time exactly what contracts for programs will cost. GILBERT MOVED AMENDMENT TO CUT OFFICE SUPPLIES FROM \$600 TO \$100, TO CUT OUT TRAVEL FOR THE SECOND CONFERENCE \$1125.00. HANSON SECONDED. STANDING VOTE ON AMENDMENT TO CUT TRAVEL TO ONE CONCERENCE, CUT OFFICE SUPPLIES FROM \$600 TO \$100, CUT THE COST OF PEOPLE PUTTING UP POSTERS, AND NO DISPLAY CASES, REROUTE MONEY INTO PROGRAMMING WAS DEFEATED WITH MAJORITY OPPOSED. PAT FLAHERTY MOVED AN AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$51,552 TO PROGRAM COUNCIL. SORENSON SECONDED. QUESTION CALLED. AMENDMENT DEFEATED WITH MAJORITY OPPOSED. RECESS CALLED AT 10:10 P.M. COMMITTEE RECONVENED AT 10:20 P.M. THE MAIN MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$45,000 TO PROGRAM COUNCIL CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

MONTANA MASQUERS: Budget request is \$26,500. Suggested budget is \$10,400, as this is a worthwhile program and the cuts are in the areas of banquets, scholarships and photography. JOHNSON MOVED \$10,400 BE ALLOCATED TO MONTANA MASQUERS. SORENSON SECONDED. Harry Gadbow, President of Masquers, said they were having trouble hiring qualified photographers because the Missoulian is so particular about pictures. SORENSON MOVED AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$11,000 TO MONTANA MASQUERS. OWENS SECONDED. Johnson recommended to reinstate \$600 to be used for publicity pictures only. AMENDED MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$11,000 GIVING BACK \$600 FOR PHOTOGRAPHY AND \$100 FOR ANYTHING ELSE EXCLUDING BANQUETS AND SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS CARRIED WITH 12 IN FAVOR AND 6 OPPOSED.

INTRAMURALS: Budget request is \$27,350.00; suggested budget is \$27,800. Included would be \$3,820 for the Outdoor Recreation Program, \$2000 for Womens' Intercollegiates. \$8000 was cut for the non-student assistants (this is for the hired staff position). Tim Parrott said the University Center has already had a budget of their own approved for a recreational organization of their own. JOHNSON MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$27,780.00 TO INTRAMURALS. COLLIER SECONDED WITH THE STIPULATION THAT BANQUETS AND LUNCHES BE EXCLUDED. OWENS MOVED AMENDMENT THAT THE OUTDOOR RECREATION PROGRAM BE CONSIDERED SEPARATE FROM INTRAMURALS. SORENSON SECONDED. Owens said it would take awhile to set up a recreation board and that the Sports Policy Committee had recommended to Faculty Senate that a new intramurals and recreation committee be set up. Owens felt that at least for the first year, outdoor recreation should be separate from intramurals until a new committee is set up. SORENSON WITHDREW SECOND AFTER OWENS MODIFIED THE INTENT OF THE AMENDMENT. AMENDMENT DIED FOR LACK OF SECOND. MAIN MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$27,780 TO INTRAMURALS CARRIED WITH MAJORITY IN FAVOR.

WOMEN'S INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORTS: The budget request is \$11,942.82; suggested budget is \$7,000. JOHNSON MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$7000 TO WOMEN'S INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORTS. EXCLUDING BOWLING. COLLIER SECONDED. By cutting bowling \$1000 the program could be expanded otherwise. NELSON MOVED AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$0 TO WOMEN'S INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORTS. SWENSON SECONDED. Collier reminded that if CB allocated money to Men's Intercollegiate Sports, the women couldn't be left out. Zona Lindemann advisor, asked CB not to cut their budget entirely as they have been committed to host a volley ball tournament. Sorenson felt that \$7000 could be allocated to them with the exclusion of bowling. Zona Lindemann said that they had 50 people last year and 79 this year without recruiting. She said they would like to get enough money to go to the competition without taking it from their own pockets because they were already paying the activity fee. NELSON WITHDREW AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$0 TO WOMEN'S INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORTS. SWENSON WITHDREW SECOND. NELSON MOVED AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$250 TO COVER COSTS OF VOLLEYBALL TOURNAMENT FAILED WITH MAJORITY OPPOSED. GRAY MOVED AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$9000 TO WOMEN'S INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORTS WITH NO BOWLING. RIDGEWAY SECONDED. Berven

said that Lindemann was right where Swarthout ought to be on keeping within a fair budget. CB is in favor of mass participation in athletics, but keeping it in intramurals rather than intercollegiate. Lindemann said that intramural sports was limited as far as excellence was concerned. QUESTION CALLED. AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$9000 WITH NO BOWLING WAS DEFEATED. MAIN MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$7000 TO WOMEN'S INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORTS EXCLUDING BOWLING CARRIED WITH MAJORITY IN FAVOR.

DRAFT COUNSELING: The budget request is \$3,885; suggested budget is \$1180.00 for summer operations. It is possible that they could come for a special allocation is the center is open during the academic year. JOHNSON MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$1180 TO DRAFT COUNSELING FOR SUMMER OPERATIONS. COLLIER SECONDED. KOLOKOTRONES MOVED AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$0 TO DRAFT COUNSELING. AMENDMENT DIED FOR LACK OF SECOND. QUESTION WAS CALLED. THE MAIN MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$1180 TO DRAFT COUNSELING FOR SUMMER OPERATIONS CARRIED WITH ALL IN FAVOR EXCEPT KOLOKOTRONES. President Sorenson said that \$14,000 would be available from Special Allocations if the counseling service needed it in September.

STUDENT ENVIRONMENTAL RESEARCH CENTER: The budget request is \$5,750; suggested budget is \$5750. This is a very worthwhile program and the full amount should be budgeted. JOHNSON MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$5750 TO SERC. GILBERT SECONDED. THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

PREGNANCY REFERRAL: The budget request is \$130; the suggested budget is \$130. This would cover a minimum program. GILBERT MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$130 TO PREGNANCY REFERRAL. SORENSON SECONDED. Berven asked if the Health Service would cover this and the answer was that they refused. Hanson said "If we are indeed supporting a student activity, then we should fund this group." QUESTION CALLED. MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$130 TO PREGNANCY REFERRAL CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

BLACK STUDENT UNION: The requested budget is \$9,500; the suggested budget is \$5465. Cuts are in travel, banquets and salaries. COLLIER MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$5465 TO BSU, CUTTING \$600 FOR STUDENT ASSISTANTS AND WORK STUDY; NO OUT OF STATE TRAVEL; NO CONFERENCE AND CLINICS; OR LUNCHEES AND BANQUETS. MADISON SECONDED. Robert McCullum, President of BSU explained that \$6500 was used for Black Week alone. TENNIS MOVED AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$5465 TO BSU WITH AN ADDITIONAL \$250 FOR IN STATE TRAVEL. RAGEN SECONDED. QUESTION CALLED. STANDING VOTE DEFEATED THE AMENDMENT WITH 9 YES and 14 NO. BERVEN MOVED AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$4500 TO BSU WITH THE STIPULATION THAT ONE SPEAKER BE ABSORBED BY PROGRAM COUNCIL. HANSON SECONDED. McCullum explained that they did not want Program Council to interfere with their program. KOLOKOTRONES MOVED A SUBSTITUTE MOTION THAT BSU WORK IN CONJUNCTION WITH PROGRAM COUNCIL ON SELECTING A SPEAKER AND ALSO A BAND FOR BLACK WEEK. SUBSTITUTE MOTION DIED FOR LACK OF SECOND. AMENDMENT TO ALLOCATE \$4500 TO BSU WITH STIPULATION THAT ONE SPEAKER BE ABSORBED BY PROGRAM COUNCIL WAS DEFEATED WITH MAJORITY OPPOSED. THE MAIN MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$5,465 TO BSU CARRIED WITH A ROLL CALL VOTE OF 14, YES, 5 NO, 2 ABSTAINING.

KYI-YO INDIAN CLUB: The budget request is \$10,180; suggested budget is \$5000. Cuts are in travel and banquets. Hanson recommended \$5600 for conferences and \$1200 for advertising. SORENSON MOVED \$8,230 TO THE KYI-YO INDIAN CLUB. HANSON SECONDED. JOHNSON MOVED A SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$4400 TO COVER INDIAN DAYS ONLY. BERVEN SECONDED. STANDING VOTE DEFEATED THE SUBSTITUTE MOTION WITH ALL OPPOSED EXCEPT BERVEN. Johnson said the Kyi-Yo Indian Club has been mis-managed and the money is not spent wisely. Hanson said that they will have a new director soon. Collier said we would be regressing if we did not help the Kyi-Yo club and that we should give these people a chance to involve themselves.

RAGEN MOVED TO A SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$8200 TO KYI-YO INDIAN CLUB WITH AN ADDITIONAL \$400 FOR IN STATE TRAVEL. GOHRICK SECONDED. TENNIS MADE A FRIENDLY MOTION TO ADD A STIPULATION THAT THERE WOULD BE NO ALLOCATION FOR BASKETBALL TEAMS. Ridgeway suggested cutting back dance and banquet with an allocation of \$3,630. SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$8200 WITH AN ADDITIONAL \$400 FOR INSTATE TRAVEL WAS DEFEATED. RIDGEWAY MOVED AMENDMENT TO MAIN MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$8230 TO THE KYI-YO INDIAN CLUB WITH THE STIPULATION OF EXCLUDING BASKETBALL. SORENSON SECONDED. TENNIS MOVED TO TABLE THIS SUBJECT BECAUSE OF THE LATE HOUR. NELSON SECONDED. Judy Abel Gray said that she would not be able to come tomorrow night. TENNIS WITHDREW MOTION TO TABLE. NELSON WITHDREW SECOND. SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$8200 WITH AN ADDITIONAL \$400 FOR IN STATE TRAVEL CARRIED WITH MAJORITY IN FAVOR.

The Committee recessed until 7:00 p.m. Thursday night.

IT IS QUESTIONABLE TO CONTINUE TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR REPRESENTATIVE TAXATION. NONETHELESS, BECAUSE GROUP CONTRIBUTIONS AND ORGANIZED EFFORTS CAN ACHIEVE MORE THAN INDIVIDUAL ATTEMPTS, LET US SPEND THIS MONEY IN WISE AND HUMANE WAYS.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this board expend student funds in a direction as to maximize student benefits; promote programs for the benefit of the student body at large and attempt to compliment all aspects of campus life.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT we realize that the individual benefits to certain groups at a cost to all students is open to question in light of the overall benefits to the University community.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT student fees not be used for university promotion or for programs which should be funded from other sources.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT we go on record as not supporting activities and events involving travel which is inconsistent with maximizing student benefits.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the agencies allocated money be held strictly accountable for those funds and that those funds be expended only for the purpose allocated.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT Central Board not allocate money to an organization without its request being on the table for at least one week.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED THAT student money be used for the promotion of a complete University community.
