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Documents from the October 25, 1972 meeting of the Associated Students of the University of Montana (ASUM)

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The meeting was called to order at 7:15 p.m. by President Bob Sorenson in the Montana Rooms of the University Center.

The minutes were approved as read.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND STANDING COMMITTEES

Sports Policy Committee: Sorenson said student members of this committee are Bruce Nelson, Bryan Flaherty, Bob Sorenson, Matt Tennis and George Kolokotronis. He said George Mitchell was chairman with Cal Murphy, Business Manager; Earl Martell, Field House Director; and Earl Lory, Chemistry Professor as the administrators and one faculty member of this committee. Sorenson said when he talked to President Pantzer he asked that those involved with the indictment and those involved with athletics not be appointed to this committee. Dr. Schuster said we should check with Dave Alt about this because any faculty members placed on this committee should go through the Faculty Effectiveness Committee rather than be appointed by the administration. Sorenson said he would talk to President Pantzer and come back with a report next week.

Sorenson announced that since Bruce Nelson will be working with Sergeant Shriver's visit to campus, he would not be able to work on the committee on investigating lectures. He appointed Steve Sorensen as the chairman of the lecture committee.

Election: Results of the general election were: 1) Steve Owens--278; 2) Andrew Olcott--189; 3) Rock Svennungsen--181; 4) Carrie Hahn--167; 5) Fred Koontz--167; 6) Chris Klieger--160; 7) Fred King--140. NELSON MOVED FOR THE ACCEPTANCE OF THE ELECTION RESULTS. BERVEN SECONDED. THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY. The newly-elected CB members are Steve Owens, Andy Olcott, and Rock Svennungsen.

Elections Committee: Members are Chris Anderson, Blake Johnson and Clay Collier. Sorenson asked them to have some concrete plans for the next meeting for getting out the student vote.

OLD BUSINESS

UM Cheerleaders' request: A representative of the cheerleaders said they wanted money for posters, etc., to advertise games. They also want to add 4 male cheerleaders for basketball season. GILBERT MOVED TO TAKE THE CHEERLEADERS' BUDGET FROM THE TABLE. BERVEN SECONDED. QUESTION CALLED. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY. Discussion followed. GILBERT MOVED TO ALLOCATE THE CHEERLEADERS \$0. BERVEN SECONDED. GRAY MOVED PREVIOUS QUESTION. FLAHERTY SECONDED. PREVIOUS QUESTION FAILED. SORENSON MADE A SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO ALLOCATE THE CHEERLEADERS \$200. Owens seconded. Sorensen said we shouldn't penalize those students who still have "rah-rah" spirit. Nelson said the cheerleaders constitute an elite group, while we should try to structure our programs so everyone can participate. He said the athletic cuts were made to prevent an athletic elite. Owens said that the "rah-rah" spirit may be dead, but there are a lot of dead people in cemeteries. He added "Death is all around us." Kolokotronis said the amount of money that would be spent is representative of the number of people interested. QUESTION CALLED. STANDING VOTE: 9 YES, 9 NO. SORENSON RULED THE SUBSTITUTE MOTION OF \$200 PASSES.

Jazz Workshop: SORENSON MOVED THAT \$500 BE ALLOCATED TO JAZZ WORKSHOP. KOLOKOTRONIS SECONDED. FLAHERTY MOVED A SUBSTITUTE MOTION FOR \$0. KIGAME SECONDED. Sorensen said that this additional \$500 was more like a promise when we allocated them the \$1000. Flaherty said he felt it was wrong to over-fund a group that is

functioning already. QUESTION. SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$0 WAS DEFEATED. QUESTION. BERVEN MOVED TO VOTE ON THE MAIN MOTION OF \$500. JOHNSON SECONDED. THE MOTION WAS CARRIED WITH MAJORITY IN FAVOR.

UM Cheerleaders' request: NELSON MOVED TO RECONSIDER THE CHEERLEADERS' REQUEST BECAUSE OF A DISCREPANCY IN THE VOTE TAKEN AND ACTUAL NUMBER OF MEMBERS PRESENT. BERVEN SECONDED. ROLL CALL VOTE: 14 YES: ANDERSON, BERVEN, FLAHERTY, GALT, GILBERT, GOHRICK, GRAY, JOHNSON, KIGAME, KOLOKOTRONES, NELSON, RAGEN, SWENSON, OLCOTT. 5 NO: COLLIER, MADISON, OWENS, SORESENSEN, TENNIS. ROLL CALL VOTE ON THE SUBSTITUTE MOTION OF \$200: 9 YES: FLAHERTY, GOHRICK, KIGAME, MADISON, OLCOTT, OWENS, RAGEN, SORESENSEN, TENNIS. 10 NO: ANDERSON, BERVEN, COLLIER, GALT, GILBERT, GRAY, JOHNSON, KOLOKOTRONES, NELSON, SWENSON. SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$200 TO CHEERLEADERS DEFEATED. Sorenson yielded his gavel to Collier. Collier refused the gavel after loud protest from several CB members. ROLL CALL VOTE ON MOTION OF \$0: 10 YES: ANDERSON, BERVEN, COLLIER, GALT, GILBERT, GRAY, JOHNSON, KOLOKOTRONES, NELSON, SWENSON. 9 NO: FLAHERTY, GOHRICK, KIGAME, MADISON, OLCOTT, OWENS, RAGEN, SORESENSEN, TENNIS. THE SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$0 TO THE CHEERLEADERS WAS PASSED.

Men's Varsity Bowling team request: ANDERSON MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$0 TO THE BOWLING TEAM. RAGEN SECONDED. QUESTION. MOTION CARRIED WITH MAJORITY IN FAVOR. Anderson said we would only be paying for a few peoples' bowling.

Library Book Fund: Motion on floor made by Gilbert was to allocate \$15,000. TENNIS MOVED A SUBSTITUTE MOTION OF \$0. COLLIER SECONDED. Collier said taking student fees to buy books was a grave mistake. Tennis said it wasn't the responsibility of the student to buy library books or study aids. Sorenson pointed out that the administration's number one priority is renovation of the old library before completion of the new one. GRAY MOVED TO TABLE THIS INDEFINITELY. GILBERT SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

NEW BUSINESS

Undergraduate Scholarly Publication proposal: This proposal was submitted by the Ad Hoc Committee for an Undergraduate Journal, Tom Fitzpatrick, Chairman; Steve Sorensen; and Garry South. JOHNSON MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$3000. SORESENSEN SECONDED. Fitzpatrick explained that their purpose was to enhance the scholarly nature of publications of this university. He said they were asking for release of one issue, which they will bring back to the board, and CB can decide whether it has merit enough for further funding. He emphasized they were not asking for a permanent commitment. QUESTION CALLED. GRAY MOVED TO TABLE THIS REQUEST FOR ONE WEEK. BERVEN SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED WITH MAJORITY IN FAVOR.

Kaimin request: The Kaimin presented its request for \$1,081.40 for the purchase of one electric typewriter, two manual typewriters, and one office desk. JOHNSON MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$1,081.40. NELSON SECONDED. ANDERSON MOVED TO TABLE THE REQUEST FOR ONE WEEK. BERVEN SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Smoking Resolution: Owens introduced the following resolution: "Central Board, representing the students of the University of Montana, and with their health, safety, and comfort in mind, wishes to remind the deans and department heads of the various departments of this university of the present rules concerning smoking in university buildings as expressed in the following (regulation 805-1) from the Faculty-Staff Handbook: To protect lives and property, rules regarding smoking have been established. Smoking is not permitted in classrooms, laboratories, or the University Theatre. It is prohibited in older buildings where the floors and basic construction is wood. Signs indicate where smoking is not allowed.

It is the responsibility of deans and department chairmen to point out these responsibilities and to monitor any flagrant violations." JOHNSON MOVED TO HEARTILY ENDORSE THIS RESOLUTION. NELSON SECONDED. QUESTION. ROLL CALL VOTE: 14 YES: ANDERSON, COLLIER, FLAHERTY, GILBERT, GOHRICK, GRAY, JOHNSON, KIGAME, MADISON, NELSON, OLCOTT, OWENS, RAGEN, SORENSON. 5 NO: BERVEN, GALT, KOLOKOTRONES, SWENSON, TENNIS. MOTION CARRIED WITH MAJORITY IN FAVOR.

Sorenson said Bozeman is considering a lobbying effort this year at an estimated cost of \$5,000 to \$6,000, which would probably be split between Bozeman and us since Eastern, Northern, Western, and Montana Tech all have dropped enrollments. NELSON MOVED TO RESERVE \$2,000 FOR A LOBBYIST. COLLIER SECONDED. BERVEN MOVED TO TABLE THIS FOR ONE WEEK. FLAHERTY SECONDED. STANDING VOTE: 14 YES, 5 NO. Gray volunteered to work on this before the Bobcat-Grizzly game. Sorenson said he would contact Bill Worden, MSU President, to set up a mutual, agreeable time for everyone to meet during the Bobcat-Grizzly game weekend. Owens said Planning Board will consider what we should lobby for during November.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Sorenson announced that applications for two appointed positions are open and that they will be brought before CB next Wednesday. He added that the deadline is Friday at 5:00 p.m.

Nelson said that next week at 3:30 p.m., Nov. 1., Sergeant Shriver will be speaking in the Oval. Anyone interested in helping, please contact Bruce Nelson or Peter Zwolle at Democratic Headquarters.

ADJOURNMENT: BERVEN MOVED TO ADJOURN. KOLOKOTRONES SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY. Meeting adjourned at 9:15 p.m.

PROPOSAL FOR AN UNDERGRADUATE SCHOLARLY PUBLICATION

Philosophy

We believe there is a demonstrated need for an outlet for the publication of undergraduate scholarship on the campus of the University of Montana. The faculty has access to many field publications. Graduate students generally have similar access to either special graduate publications or, through faculty contacts, to a variety of professional journals. The undergraduate, however, has at present virtually no outlet for the publication of scholarly works. Many a worthy manuscript, entailing a great amount of original research, has been denied publication because of this.

We also feel that a high-quality publication such as we envision, with special emphasis on pieces relating to Montana, will serve as a valuable contribution by undergraduate students to the whole field of Montana scholarship. With a sufficient amount of funding and preparation work, such a publication as we propose could become, were it to continue publication, one of the few substantial legacies that University students leave to future generations of University of Montana students, and, indeed, to the state of Montana as a whole.

Our proposal of an undergraduate-staffed publication, accepting only undergraduate manuscripts, would also seem to be in keeping with the general trend of moving from predominant use of student fees for athletics and purely recreational activities, to projects of a more lasting, educational value.

Structure

The editorial structure we envision consists of three levels:

- 1) An Honorary Editorial Board. This board would consist of 10 or 12 prominent Montanans who have some association with scholarship and/or some affiliation with the University of Montana system. The purpose of this board would be a) to provide some credibility and prominence for the publication, and b) to assist when possible in terms of advice or other assistance not generally available from

(e.g. contracts, financing, etc.). Some of the names we have mentioned include Mike Mansfield, A. B. Guthrie, and K. Ross Toole, among others.

2) An Editorial Board. This board would consist of 5 to 7 members, a majority of undergraduates, the rest faculty and perhaps, a graduate student. It would be the function of this board to collect and review all manuscripts submitted for publication. After reading of the manuscripts, the entire lot would be presented to the co-editors, with a certain number being designated as superior to the others.

3) Co-Editors. All production, editorial and publication details would be handled by the co-editors, of which there will probably be three, all of whom would be undergraduates. Final selection of all manuscripts would be their responsibility, as well as distribution and promotion aspects.

Content

Our goal is a publication the subject matter of which will cut across disciplines and touch many different fields. Attempts will be made to maintain a broad appeal, and a wide area of subject matter, so that the publication will not become too undisciplinatory in orientation.

As much as possible, we would want to keep the subject matter of the manuscripts published within areas of general--or at least quasi-general--concern. In other words, nothing too "buff-oriented," but nothing too overly-technical, either. In all cases, emphasis will be placed on documentation, lightness of style, readability and unique viewpoints. Thesis-type pieces, the subject matter of which would seem tedious, frivolous, or both to the average reader, will be avoided.

Poetry and creative literary pieces will not be considered for publication. Profuse illustrations, pictures, or art work will be avoided. Illustrations (graphs, pictures, etc.) will generally be used only when indispensable in order to convey more clearly the subject matter.

Format

The publication will be standard journal size, 8 1/2 x 11, on standard off-white journal stock. In journal form, the table of contents will be printed on the cover. We have decided on a tentative name for the publication, 'The Montana Undergraduate Review.'

Each issue will contain, as the lead article, a manuscript which deals with a Montana subject--historical, political, geological, anthropological, etc. A competition will be held for the "Montana Manuscript," with a token award given to the winner. This idea will insure that, as far-flung as the subject matter might become, there will always be at least one manuscript which contributes to Montana scholarship.

Manuscripts selected for publication will be handled in this manner: 1) each manuscript selected for publication will be submitted by the editorial board to several individuals knowledgeable in its respective fields; 2) these individuals will read the manuscript and submit critiques, which will be printed behind the manuscript; 3) the author will be asked to submit a rebuttal in defense of his work, which will then be printed behind the critique. It is intended that the dynamics of this exchange will provoke more thought and response from the readers.

An active "readers write" section will be encouraged in later issues. A book review section is being considered. Paid notices of publication of new books or publications might be considered.

Cost Approximation

We would like an initial run of 1500 copies. The print shop has given us a ballpark quotation of \$2100 printing costs at this run. Attempts to economize through use of less expensive stock, and a few other printer's tricks, are already reflected in the \$2100 figure.

We will need \$500 for additional printing costs. Included in this are mailing jackets, posters, calls for manuscripts, etc., and related art services. It should

noted that most of this figure will be used for one-time-only expenses, which would not appear as a cost factor in printing future issues of the publication.

We have set a figure of \$300 for advertising and promotion, which would both be essential to the success of the publication; of \$50 for postage; and \$50 miscellaneous. It should be remembered that, due to the fact we have no precedent from which to accurately estimate related expenses, these are rough figures, and may be either high or low in the respective categories.
