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Documents from the November 1, 1972 meeting of the Associated Students of the University of Montana (ASUM)

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The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by President Bob Sorenson in the lounge of Knowles Hall.

Corrections to minutes: President Sorenson said the motion to allocate \$6200 to Intramurals was left out of the minutes last meeting. Steve Sorensen moved to allocate \$6200 to Intramurals. Owens seconded. Issue was tabled for one week. Minutes approved as corrected.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND STANDING COMMITTEES

Donation to Library Book Fund Drive: Sorenson said that Tom Judge personally donated \$250 to the library book fund drive. Judge has also offered to head a group statewide for the purpose of collecting funds for library books. Sorenson believes that Judge is sincerely interested in the library and in education around the state.

Volunteers to remind students to vote: Business Manager Blake Johnson asked for CB volunteers to call people to remind them to vote on election day. There will be a list in the ASUM office for volunteers to sign.

Committee to interview CB candidates: The sub-committee appointed by Sorenson to interview CB delegates to the off-campus positions, Randy Gray, Matt Tennis and Christine Anderson, could not give a final report as two of the candidates were unable to be present at the first interview. Final decision should be available next week. Sorenson said he had a unanimous recommendation from the committee to appoint Monte Beck as the organized off-campus Central Board delegate. Beck was not present. FLAHERTY MOVED THAT CB ACCEPT MONTE BECK AS ORGANIZED OFF-CAMPUS CENTRAL BOARD DELEGATE. OWENS SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED WITH MAJORITY IN FAVOR.

Planning Board: Berven reported that Planning Board met Monday night and had a long interview with Del Brown concerning bonding commitments, structure of the bonding situation on the University Center, family housing, dormitories and the lodge. Berven said they are working closely with Matt Tennis and should have a detailed report next week. Next week Planning Board will start considering what areas the ASUM wants to work on in the upcoming legislative session. Berven said that anyone interested in lobbying at the legislature is invited to come to Planning Board 7:00 p.m. Monday, November 6, in the ASUM conference room.

Rock Svennungsen introduction to CB: President Sorenson introduced Rock Svennungsen, newly elected delegate, to Central Board.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Undergraduate Scholarly Research Journal: Sorenson took the motion off the table to allocate \$3000 toward publishing an Undergraduate Scholarly Research Journal. Gary South said that the cost of printing would run about \$2100. QUESTION CALLED. PRESIDENT SORENSON CALLED FOR A VOTE ON THE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$3000 TO THE UNDERGRADUATE SCHOLARLY RESEARCH JOURNAL. MOTION CARRIED WITH MAJORITY IN FAVOR.

Kaimin budget request: Sorenson took the motion off the table to allocate \$1,081.40 to the Kaimin. Flaherty asked Conrad Yunker of the Kaimin why this budget was not considered last spring with the other budgets. Sorenson said that CB requested the Kaimin to come back in the fall. GRAY MADE SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$600 FOR THE PURCHASE OF ONE DESK AND TWO MANUAL TYPEWRITERS. MADISON SECONDED. Owens asked Gray why he moved to allocate \$600 instead of the original figure of \$643.40. GRAY MADE FRIENDLY AMENDMENT TO THE SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO READ \$643.40 INSTEAD OF \$600.00. BERVEN SECONDED. Johnson resisted friendly amendment saying that if Gray is objecting to the Kaimin allocation on the grounds that

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it is frugal, we have this quarter \$1,514 in special allocations and the total balance of \$1,8402.80 plus the next item on the agenda is \$2,000 for a lobbyist. For these reasons Johnson did not see why the amendment should carry. QUESTION CALLED. President Sorenson called for a vote on the substitute motion to allocate \$643.40 to the Kaimin. SUBSTITUTE MOTION PASSED WITH 10 IN FAVOR AND 5 OPPOSED.

Intramural budget: Sorenson took the motion from the table to allocate \$6200 to Intramural activities. SORENSON CALLED FOR VOTE ON THE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$6200 TO INTRAMURAL ACTIVITIES. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Lobbyist: President Sorenson received a call from Kurt Kreuger, President of Student Government in Bozeman, regarding joint lobbyist services. Sorenson was busy with the political rally and was unable to talk with Kreuger. He said he would have information on this tomorrow.

NEW BUSINESS

Rifle Club budget: Gary Balaz, President of the U of M Rifle Club submitted a budget for fall, winter and spring quarters of the 1972-73 academic year. He said the request was about $\frac{1}{2}$ that of last year's request. Total request submitted by Balaz is \$459.00 to take five shooters to three matches. OWENS MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$459.00 TO THE RIFLE CLUB. GOHRICK SECONDED. DISCUSSION FOLLOWED. JOHNSON MOVED TO TABLE THE RIFLE CLUB REQUEST UNTIL NEXT WEEK. OWENS SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED WITH 2 OPPOSED, SORENSON AND MADISON.

Program Council: Jim Scott introduced the new appointment to Program Council sub-committee, Cultural Concert Coordinator, Miss Rosemary Edens. Edens will replace Dennis Hall who resigned last summer. TENNIS MOVED TO ACCEPT ROSEMARY EDENS AS CULTURAL CONCERTS COORDINATOR. BERVEN SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Cheer Leaders budget: SORENSON MOVED TO ALLOCATE \$201.00 TO THE CHEER LEADERS. OWENS SECONDED. Bruce Nelson said this is the same motion that was defeated last week. THE CHAIR RULED THAT IT WAS NOT THE SAME MOTION. BERVEN APPEALED THE DECISION OF THE CHAIR. SORENSON CALLED A VOTE FOR ALL THOSE IN FAVOR OF SUSTAINING THE DECISION OF THE CHAIR STATING THAT THE ALLOCATION FOR \$201 TO THE CHEER LEADERS IS NOT THE SAME MOTION DEFEATED LAST WEEK. THE DECISION OF THE CHAIR HOLDS WITH 9 IN FAVOR AND 6 OPPOSED. JOHNSON MOVED TO TABLE THE MOTION TO ALLOCATE \$201 TO THE CHEER LEADERS. ANDERSON SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED WITH 6 IN FAVOR AND 9 OPPOSED.

Housing Coordinator for S.A.C.: President Sorenson asked Tennis and Madison to give their concepts of hiring a coordinator for SAC as they are directly connected with it. Sorenson said it would cost from \$4,000 to \$8,000 to hire a director and that he is against CB appropriating this money, but would favor a loan or grant from the Foundation. Pat Madison strongly feels in favor of Student Action Center, saying that its purpose is to serve the students. Madison feels a coordinator should be hired immediately as SAC is just getting off the ground. He favors hiring Jim Betty as he is the founder of this organization and has been working diligently with it for many months. Tennis said he didn't feel SAC was ready for a professional coordinator at \$4,000 to \$8,000 a year, but that the organization is badly in need of an office manager. Tennis feels that if there isn't someone put in charge of this office, SAC will fizzle out. Steve Sorensen favored hiring a coordinator and checking on possible ways to support this. President Sorenson appointed a committee of Tennis, Madison and Anderson, with Johnson as chair, to look into what CB should do about SAC. Sorenson felt that for this year \$4,000 to \$8,000 should not be put out for a coordinator but that one student should be paid about \$35 to \$45 a month as this program is for the students and should be run by the students. SORENSON MOVED THAT THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY SORENSON, (JOHNSON,

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CHAIRMAN, TENNIS, MADISON AND ANDERSON) TO STUDY CB'S ACTIONS CONCERNING SAC BE APPROVED BY THE BOARD. RAGEN SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED WITH ALL IN FAVOR EXCEPT MADISON AND OWENS. President Sorenson gave the committee two weeks to compile a report for CB.

Special Announcement: Gary Bogue, University Center Activities Coordinator, expressed his appreciation to Central Board in making the Jazz Workshop a big success. Bogue said the attendance at this program was well over 1,000 and that the group had 4 encores. Bogue said this wouldn't have been possible without the cooperation of Central Board.


Adjournment: SORENSEN MOVED TO ADJOURN. MADISON SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

This is a financial request for the University of Montana Rifle Club and Team for Fall, Winter and Spring Quarters of the 1972-73 academic year. This request is specifically for five shooters to go to three rifle matches, two of which are located in Cheney, Washington, at the Eastern Washington State College, and one at Bozeman, Montana at the Montana State University. These matches are needed in order to give the shooters shoulder to shoulder competition with other college rifle teams, and to pay for match fees in the NRA intercollegiate postal competition and the local Western Montana small bore league.

As previously stated by the student government, the desire is to spend student funds to support intramural competition. Plans are being initiated and a request made to Vice President Mitchell to convert the swimming pool in the Men's Gym to a multiple use facility for archery, golf and riflery. This range could realistically be used for intramural type shooting on campus, where the range presently rented in Bonner cannot. Without funds to support minimal inter-collegiate postal and shoulder to shoulder type matches, the real incentive to collegiate competitive shooting would be lacking. The current rifle club could well dissolve before a range is available on campus without the incentive of intercollegiate competition.

This request is approximately one-fourth that of last years request. We have cut back on the number of shooters going to the meets and the number of matches attended. The money is needed for transportation, food, lodging, and match fees. The cost is computed as follows: eight dollars a day for food and lodging per person per day, and seven cents a mile for the transportation of five shooters to and from the matches.

STUDENT RESEARCH PROJECTS
Fall quarter 1972

1. Consumer Relations Board -- The purpose of this organization is to settle student consumer grievances and when possible, employ tactics of "preventive consumerism."
2. Index-listing system for off-campus student housing -- This project defines off-campus housing problems, and is in the process of establishing a cooperative placement service for UM students.
3. Student - Landlord - Tenant Legal Rights Handbook -- This handbook will establish obligations and rights of both the landlord and tenant.
4. Public Utilities Study -- This study includes in-depth research of Montana public utilities. A consumer utilities handbook is in the process of being written.
5. Unit Pricing -- This study will examine the pros and cons of unit pricing and eventually result in public information and passage of legislation.
6. Social Work 485 -- This is a course under which students can receive 1-3 credits per quarter for doing volunteer work in community agencies.
7. Water Chemistry of the Clark Fork River -- This project includes analyzing water samples to determine possible pollutants.
8. Clipping File of Congressional Record -- Articles and bills relating to environment will be kept on file for future reference.
9. Coal Development in Eastern Montana -- This study consists of in-depth research of the coal situation in Montana and an eventual reference for public information.
10. Air Pollution in Missoula Valley -- This study will analyze the air pollution in Missoula and be a source of public information soon.
11. Wilderness Study -- Research and study of various roadless areas for possible inclusion as "wilderness" and "primitive" areas.
12. Missoula Bikeway System -- See that the proposed Missoula Bikeway System is implemented by spring of 1973.
