- 130ab General Sociology; 4 credits, prerequisite, Sociology 61ab; offered in the spring quarter.
- Foreign Labor Movements; 3 credits; prerequisite, Economics 131; offered in the spring quarter.
- Criminology and Penology; 3 credits; prerequisite, 10 credits in Economics and Business Administration, including Social Problems and consent of instructor; offered in the winter quarter; replaces Economic and Social Problems 181b.
- Social Progress; credit increased from 3 to 4; change effective spring quarter, 1928.
- Poverty and Relief; 3 credits; prerequisite, 10 credits in Economics and Business Administration, including Social Problems, and consent of instructor; offered in the autumn quarter; replaces Economic and Social Problems 181a.
- Population Problems; 3 credits; prerequisite, 15 credits in Economics; offered in the spring quarter.

DUCATION

- The Teaching of Composition (transferred from English Department--Formerly English 190a).
- 106 The Teaching of Literature (transferred from English Department -- formerly English 190b).
- S140 Educational Guidance; 4 credits; prerequisite, junior standing or teaching experience; offered in the summer quarter.

GLISH

- S66 Production of Operettas; 2½ credits; prerequisite, junior standing; offered in the summer quarter.
 - 79 English Readings; l or 2 credits each quarter; prerequisite, junior standing, majoring in English, high scholarship record; offered every quarter.
- 5157 Advanced Shakespeare; 21 credits; prerequisite, junior standing; offered in the summer session.
- S180 Literature in the Eighteenth Century; 4 credits; prerequisite, junior standing; offered in the summer session.
- Studies in English; 2-3 credits each quarter; prerequisite senior standing, majoring in English, high scholarship; offered ever, quarter.

22b - Forest Nursery Practice; 2 to 4 credits; prerequisite, Silvics 22a; offered in the spring quarter.

STORY

- International Organization; 3 credits - spring; 25 credits_summer; prerequisite, junior standing and consent of instructor; offered in the spring and summer quarters.

JOURNALISM

- 12abc Survey of Journalism; 5 quarters; 5 credits each quarter presents its, junior or senior standing. The course is for non-majors in Journalism and is designed to meet the needs of those who wish to acquire acquaintance with newspaper practice and usage, particularly as concerns publicity and public relations.
- Senior Practice Laboratory; replaces Journalism 48; limited to seniors of high standing in Journalism and graduates.

MATHEMATICS

- Selected Chapters in Calculus; 5 credits; prerequisite, Integral and Differential Calculus; offered alternate years in the autumn quarter.
- 150 Seminar; variable credit; prerequisite, preparation for special work; offered any quarter.

PHARMACY

- Evolution of Pharmacy; 5 credits; open to third and fourth year pharmacy students; offered in the summer quarter.
- S42 Pharmaceutical Ethics; 2 credits; offered in the summer quarter.

RELIGION

- Current Religious Thinking; 22 credits; open to advanced students; offered in the summer quarter.
