 evaluating transcripts from two-year colleges and normal schools:

The following statement of the policy of the State Univer-
 sity has been prepared for the information of students who
 apply for college credit for studies pursued in colleges
 where courses of study are approved by the North Central
 Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools or similar
 accrediting agency for two years only.

Students Who Complete a Part of the Two-Year Normal College
 Course.

Students who complete only part of the two-year norma
 college course may receive credit at the State Univer
 sity for such work of college grade as may be found t
 represent the equivalent of courses required or ac-
 cepted at the State University.

Students Who Graduate From the Two-Year Normal College Course.

Graduates of an approved two-year normal college course requiring fifteen units for entrance are admitted to Junior standing in the State University. Students will be required to satisfy the restricted elective requirements which are normally completed during the Freshman and Sophomore years.

Students Who Graduate From the Two-Year College Course and Have Also Earned Credits in Subjects After Graduation.

Students who desire to receive a degree from the State University are advised to enter the State University at the beginning of their Junior year in order that there may be adequate time spent in the State University to comply with the requirement of a major department (See requirements under department heading in the catalogue), requirements for the University Certificate of Qualification to Teach (See page 145 of the catalogue), and the restricted elective requirements (See page 60 of the catalogue).

In exceptional cases, however, the State University may give college credit for courses taken at normal and other colleges after graduation from the two-year course at the same college. Students who seek such credit should send to the Registrar of the State University, (1) A transcript of record, (2) A list of subjects already taken or to be taken in the normal or other college after graduation from the two-year course, (3) Name of major department to be entered at the State University, (4) A statement concerning intention as to earning the University Certificate of Qualification to Teach (See page 145 of the catalogue), (5) A statement from the college concerning the content of the courses for which credit is sought in the State University.

Irrespective of the Number of Credits Granted by the State University for Courses Taken Elsewhere, no student transferring from a normal or other non-degree granting college to the State University should contemplate graduation from the State University without attending six quarters (two college years) and earning at least seventy-five credits in residence at the State University; exceptions to this policy should not be relied upon by a student without approval certified by the Registrar of the State University.


Residence of grad. 2-year colleges

The policy outlined in this statement has become highly advisable because of the increasing importance given by Colleges of Arts and Sciences to the distinction between the curriculum of the Freshman-Sophomore years and the curriculum of the Junior-Senior years.

The recommendation was unanimously approved.

9. The President announced the standing committees of the faculty for 1931-32.
