

4. Announcements were made and discussions held as follows:



February 5, 1936

1. A meeting of the faculty was held at 4:10 P.M. pursuant to adjournment, with President Simmons presiding.

2. President Simmons made several announcements, including (1) report of recent meeting of the Executive Council at the office of Executive Secretary Swain, (2) a proposed inspection of the University by State Board of Examiners.

3. A report of the deliberations of the Special Committee of the faculty on a faculty-student council was made by Dean Leaphart, who moved adoption of the recommendation of the Committee, and that the faculty proceed to election of the Committee provided for in the recommendation. The motion was duly seconded, and unanimously approved, The recommendation adopted being as follows: That the Faculty should elect five of its members to serve on a proposed joint Student and Faculty Committee or Council in case of the formation of such an organization; that these five should arrange for a convocation of students next week, or as soon thereafter as possible, and propose to the students there assembled the formation of a joint organization along the lines of the joint committee proposed in the Faculty Resolution of May 23, 1935, with this difference, that the formation should be for a trial period of two years, or until January 1, 1938, the trial being preliminary to a possible permanent organization.

*Student-Faculty Council election of council members*

A motion to postpone election to a later meeting of the faculty was lost.

A motion by Daughters, seconded by Leaphart, that the vote be by ballot, for five candidates, that candidates receiving a majority be declared elected, and that the later ballot should be on the next five highest was unanimously approved.
