1. A meeting of the faculty was held at 4:10 p.m. on call of President James A. McCain, who presided.

- 2. The minutes of the meeting of November 16 were approved.
- 3. The following announcements were made by the President:
  - a. The purpose of the change in location of faculty meetings was to bring the gr closer together and provide a better atmosphere for discussion.
  - b. Information was given about the 26 pre-fabricated houses which will be release and are to be set up for rental to veterans. The plan to attempt to finance purchase and installation of the houses by making a statewide offering of cer ficates of indebtedness was described.
  - c. A telegram to Washington, D.C., signed jointly by a group of educational institutions including Montana State University, and proposing substitution of civilian education for compulsory military training was read.
- 4. The President read his proposal to the Budget and Policy Committee for their consideration of the following changes in committee structure:
  - a. Elimination of the following committees upon the establishment of a coordinat student personnel program:

Advisers Cooperative Housing Counseling Freshman Week New Students and High School Relations Student Loan Testing

b. Elimination of the following committees and the assignment of their function to the individual staff members indicated:

Calendar - Dean of Women Schedule - Registrar Veterans Education - Director of Veterans Education, Dean of Men, and Studen Personnel Officer Archives - Librarian

Campus Development - Combine with the Planning Committee into a single campus Planning and Development Committee. Defense Problems Committee - Abolish.

c. Discharge of the following committees upon completion of their specific missions:

President "cCain stated his desire that each of the standing committees draw up a statement of mission, tasks, and standards of performance and said that he hoped the Budget and Policy Committee would be the first one to so as an example to the others.

Upon the request of the President for a report from the Budget and Policy Committee on these proposals, Dr. Gordon Castle stated that the committee was in favor of the proposals but was interested in considering the proposed statements as to mission, tasks, and standards of performance with the thought that there may still be some overlapping which may be eliminated.

Dr. Castle stated that copies of regulations pertaining to 12 months service contracts were distributed to faculty members and that the Budget and Policy Committee was starting a study to work out problems in connection with these contracts. He stated that a similar study was being undertaken at Montana State College and that ideas would be exchanged between the two schools.

President McCain stated that consideration should be given to such problems as compensation for correspondence study instruction, and he hoped that a plan could be worked out so that faculty members could be encouraged to accept assignments in their particular fields when it did not interfere with their regular work.

As there was not sufficient time left for Professor Toelle's report on the state employees' retirement system, that report was deferred until the next meeting, and the meeting was adjourned.
