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Documents from the October 5, 1966 meeting of the Associated Students of the University of Montana (ASUM)

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CENTRAL BOARD

OCTOBER 5, 1966

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 in the Activities Room of the Lodge by President Tom Behan. The minutes were approved with the following corrections: the meeting with Bozeman will be NOVEMBER 5th instead of OCTOBER 5th; and under Publications MSBPA should read MSPA.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Central Board will be working with Planning Board on Referendum 64 in which the possibility of using the money from taxes on cigarettes for construction of buildings. Tom asked that the Commissioners have their committee meeting times, places and advisors lined up by next week. Elections for Freshmen candidates will be held October 18th and 25th of this month. Charlie "Brown" Artman will be speaking next Tuesday on campus. He was one of the student riot leaders at Berkley. Behan welcomed Dean Coonrod to Central Board and announced that Dr. Dwyer would be in attendance next week as the other faculty advisor for the year.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Morrow announced that twelve students applied for Judicial Council Board of Review and that one position of alternate was left open because there weren't enough Independents applying. MORROW MOVED CENTRAL BOARD APPROVE GARY LIBECAP, DIANNA MCKIBBEN, AND BOB FLETCHER AS REGULAR MEMBER AND JANICE HOON AS ALTERNATE. SECONDED BY KITZENBERGER. Barnard asked for the qualifications used in selection. Morrow said they were looking for students who were not too busy but yet knew enough of the campus activities to be involved. MINEMYER CALLED FOR THE QUESTION. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. MORROW MOVED CENTRAL BOARD APPROVE TERRY ANDERSON, GEORGEANNE EDDINGTON, LOREN HAARR AND ANN MURDO TO ALUMNI BOARD. SECONDED BY MOORE. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. Dean Van Horne of the school of Pharmacy will be the faculty advisor. Applications for all committees will be at the Lodge Desk.

BUSINESS MANAGER

Minemyer read a letter from a college in Greece asking for a donation to support needy students. It was decided in Budget and Finance to disregard all such requests. Budget and Finance moved to allocate \$600 for the ASG convention in Oklahoma. Tom explained that the fare was \$188.36 for one round trip ticket. He distributed the reference manual which contains samplings of material gained at the convention and throughout the year. MINEMYER MOVED CENTRAL BOARD SEND TWO DELEGATES TO THE ASG CONVENTION IN OKLAHOMA AT THE EXPENSE OF \$600 WITH THE STIPULATION ANY MONEY LEFT WOULD BE RETURNED. SECONDED BY BARBER. Kitzenberg opposed the motion saying the convention was a junket and there were better places for the money to be spent on the campus. He felt that not that much was gained from the convention. Barber wanted to know if the things gained at the convention would be used on campus to the extent it would benefit the students. Minemyer pointed out that the ideas and better perspectives gained, would be invaluable, plus taking the name of the school there, especially if we do hold a seminar on school newspapers. Tate said that a convention of this nature would benefit the delegates and the students and concluded by CALLING FOR THE QUESTION. BARNARD MOVED TO AMEND THE MOTION THAT PRESIDENT BEHAN AND IF

POSSIBLE, WITHOUT CHAPERONE RESTRICTIONS, RAMARRAH MOORE BE THE DELEGATES. SECONDED BY NOREEN. AMENDMENT PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. THE ORGINAL MOTION PASSED WITH KITZENBERG AND BARNARD OPPOSING. KITZENBERG APPEALED THE DECISION OF THE CHAIR. SECONDED BY LEARY. BEHAN CALLED FOR A ROOL CALL VOTE. THE MOTION WAS DEFEATED WITH BARNARD, KITZENBERG, LEERY, MINEMYER AND MOORE IN FAVOR. MOORE MOVED THAT ASUM FUNDS NO LONGER BE USED TO SUPPORT WOMENS INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS OR BOWLING. SECONDED BY LEARY. BARNARD MOVED TO TABLE THE MOTION BECASUE MARC DAVIS WASN NOT PRESENT AND THERE WASN'T A QUORUM AT BUDGET AND FINANCE. SECONDED BY MINEMYER. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

ATHLETICS

Hansen announced he would be meeting Schwank Thursday.

FIELDHOUSE AND PHYSICAL PLANT

Tate announced that the committee would be set up by next week.

ALUMNI

Presser asked for more members. He is waiting for Hugh Edwards to select Missoula men to serve on the committee. The commission should be set up by next week.

PUBLICATIONS

Morton said meetings will be held Tuesdays at 4:00. Applications for M Book editor and staff appoinments for the Garrett are to be announced next week in the Kiamih. A committee was appointed to look into the possibility of publishing the "Who's New" booklet.

PLANNING

Haarr announced that the committee will be working of Referendum 64 and that the committee will be more organized next week. Haarr asked that the duties and purposes of each commission be published in the Kiamin with a request for applications.

TRADITION

Berger announced that Mr. Fritz will be the advisor and that requests were sent out for membership to the different houses.

OLD BUSINESS

MINEMYER MOVED GREG HANSEN TRY AND GET SCHWANK TO COME TO THE MEETING NEXT WEEK TO EXPLAIN THE ISSUE OF FINANCING INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS AND BOWLING. SECONDED BY NOREEN. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

BARBER MOVED FOR ADJOURNMENT. SECONDED BY NOREEN. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.
