The meeting was called to order at 7:05 p.m. by President John Ross.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ross introduced Paula Latham who will be covering Central Board for the Kaimin this year. He stated that the purpose of the meeting tonight was to outline his plans for the coming year and what he expected student government to accomplish this year. He feels that the student president and Central Board, especially the president, must have more power to initiate projects; that cooperation is the best tool in order to get along with the Kaimin and the administration; that Central Board should be a liason between the students and the administration; that Central Board must represent the student body in segments; that Central Board must produce services for the students; that the delegates should be student leaders; and that more students should be included in student government. With these in mind, Ross went on to outline some of the projects that would be considered this year. A new agenda procedure was outlined so that the delegates could have an opportunity to study the proposals coming before Central Board before the meeting and so that the press could have a chance to get the agenda in the paper. The filing system in the office is going to be standarized so that it will be easier to find material. All committee chairmen were asked to come to the office and clean out their files. The ASUM office is going to be redecorated with new lighting and new chairs. The Fine Arts Department has been asked to make a wall painting for the office illustrating some form of the University. The committee system is going to be cleaned up. All committee chairmen are going to be required to submit written as well as oral reports each week. Ross feels that the president should be chairman of planning board. A letter has been written to Mr. Whitwell and the Bearpaws so a section will be reserved for the band at the south end of the east bleachers for the football games. Ross also feels that the delegates and officers should make themselves available for speeches on campus so that more people will know what Central Board is doing. Whitey is checking into the possibility of having lockers in the library for Missoula students to store their personal belongings. Stockamp is going to contact the hockey club and see if they are interested in having an ice rink this year. Ross has asked Lanman to check into the possibility of getting complimentary tickets for the delegates, officers, and advisors of Central Board. Cosman has been gathering information on the possibility of getting a train to go to Bozeman. Wendte is expanding the Budget and Finance Committee and they are going to start a long range study of the budget. He is also studying the Kaimin staff wages. Ross has put Nisbet in charge of gathering information on Honey Bears, which is an organization composed of attractive girls who act as official hostesses for the campus. IBM Polls are under study by Reagor. Ross is looking into the possibility of having prayer breakfasts here on campus. These might bring political and religious dignitaries to the campus. In order to bring student government closer to the students, Ross would like to set up a press conference in the student union lobby each week. Students on campus who are in the limelight would be interviewed and then the audience could ask questions. Last spring Central Board gave the go ahead on the Model United Nations for high school students. Next week there will be a report from Louise Snyder on this. Also last spring Central Board was checking into the possibilities of having FM radios in

the dorms. Reagor has gathered some information on this during the summer. Central Board will continue to study this program. Also Ross is thinking of have grant-in aid programs. Ross would like to check into the possibility of organizing a "M" Club on campus. It would be beneficial to both the athletes themselves and to the students. Ross said that he would be taking a stand on the issues arising here on campus and also issues throughout the state and nation. He believes that this is important. This summer a committee was formed with President Johns and approximately 30 students on campus to discuss the problems of the students. Any suggestions for discussion can be brought to the ASUM office. Ross also put Behan in charge of checking into reapportionment and representation.

NEW BUSINESS

Freshman elections have been set. The primary will be held on October 20 and the general elections will be October 27. Petitions and rules will be available on Monday, October 11, in the ASUM office. The ASG convention will be October 14 through 16, in Lafayette, Indiana. BEHAN MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD SEND THE PRESIDENT AND VICE PRESIDENT TO THE ASG CONVENTION IN INDIANA. SECONDED BY COSMAN. Behan said that it is important to have two people attend because there will be about 30 meetings in the span of two days and two people will be able to attend more of those meetings. Ross said that there would be a \$25 fee for board and room for each delegate. Ross relinquished the chair to Brett. BEHAN AMENDED HIS MOTION TO READ THAT CENTRAL BOARD PAY \$25 FOR BOARD AND ROOM FOR EACH DELEGATE. SECONDED BY COSMAN. Ross then brought up the idea of plane fares. Nichols said that the fares would run around \$180 round trip for each person. BEHAN AMENDED HIS AMENDMENT TO READ THAT CENTRAL BOARD PAY FOR TWO ROUND TRIP TICKETS FOR THE PRESIDENT AND VICE PRESIDENT TO ATTEND THE CONVENTION. SECONDED BY COSMAN. The question was called for on the amendment to the amendment. THE AMENDMENT TO THE AMENDMENT PASSED WITH CROMWELL, LANMAN, AND REAGOR ABSTAINING. THE QUESTION WAS CALLED FOR ON THE AMENDMENT THAT CENTRAL BOARD PAY FOR THE TWO ROUND TRIP TICKETS AND ALSO THE \$25 FEE FOR BOARD AND ROOM FOR EACH DELEGATE. THE AMENDMENT PASSED WITH CROMWELL ABSTAINING. THE QUESTION WAS CALLED FOR ON THE MOTION THAT CENTRAL BOARD SEND TWO DELEGATES (THE PRESIDENT AND VICE PRESIDENT) TO THE ASG CONVENTION IN LAFAYETTE, INDIANA, AND THAT CENTRAL BOARD PAY THE \$25 FEE FOR BOARD AND ROOM FOR EACH DELEGATE AMOUNTING TO \$50 AND ALSO PAY FOR THE ROUND TRIP TICKETS TO THE CONVENTION FOR EACH DELEGATE. THE MOTION PASSED WITH LANMAN OPPOSED AND CROMWELL, STOCKAMP, REAGOR, AND NISBET ABSTAINING.

PUBLICATIONS BOARD

Debbie Archibald recommended that Central Board accept the board's recommendation of Ellen Broadus as editor of the M Book. COSMAN MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD ACCEPT PUBLICATIONS BOARD'S RECOMMENDATION OF HAVING ELLEN BROADUS AS EDITOR OF THE M BOOK. SECONDED BY FAIRLEY. Cosman said that the first deadline would be March 31. Archibald said that the by-laws would not have to be waived. MOTION PASSED WITH BEHAN ABSTAINING. Archibald said that the Sentinel could not be promised before December.

BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Wendte said that Budget and Finance would meet next Tuesday at 7:00 p.m.

Cosman said that there would be a train going to Bozeman pending approval from the Dean's office. We will have to sell at least 300 tickets. There will be six cars each seating about 56 students. There would also be a band in the baggage car for dancing. The train would leave here about 7:00 a.m. arriving in Bozeman about 11:30 and leaving there again at 1:00 p.m. The Grizzly Growlers, Spurs, and Bearpaws have already been contacted. The tickets will run about \$8.00 each.

Marc Davis reported on the Movie Program. Last spring Central Board allocated \$250 to bring films to the campus. These films will be shown at 8:00 Thursday, October 7, and the Thursday after that. From then on they will be shown on Wednesday in the Yellowstone room. There will be no charge and anyone can attend. The schedule is as follows: MACBETH on October 7; THE FOUR RELIGIONS on October 14; ISRAEL, FORMOSA STORY, AND ISLANDS OF THE SOUTH PACIFIC on October 20; RED CHINA on October 27; MARK TWAIN'S AMERICA on November 3; MARRIAGE TODAY and MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE on November 10; NETHERLANDS: PAST AND PRESENT, INTRODUCING NORWAY, and INTRODUCING FRANCE on November 17; GREAT EXPECTATIONS on December 1; and some comedies on December 13, 14, and 15. If this is a success, there will be a motion to include this under the Committee on Lectures and Convocations.

SPECIAL EVENTS COMMITTEE

Lee Tickell said that the different seating arrangement used during the Lettermen worked out better. The gate at the Lettermen was \$3,600. The Kingston Trio cancelled out for Homecoming and in their place will be the Back Porch Majority. The concert has been moved up from 8:15 to 8:30 p.m. Block seating will be available again this year and the tickets will go on sale on October 11. The publicity has been taken care of by Bruce Tate. The committee is also trying to get the Wailers in for the dance. Special Events will have their first meeting next Tuesday.

STUDENT LOAN COMMITTEE

Wendte said that the committee has met and the loans will be increased up to \$300. Most of this money will be loaned out for a period of 30 to 60 days.

PLANNING BOARD

Behan said that Planning Board would meet next Tuesday at 6:30 p.m. The topic of reapportionment would be discussed. Behan would like the policy statements of all committees to be submitted to Planning Board.

VISITING LECTURES AND CONVOCATIONS COMMITTEE

Brett read the list of the speakers that will be coming to the university,

The meeting was adjourned. Because of the oversight of not approving the minutes, the meeting was again called to order. The corrections included: Waldton in the attendance should have been Waldron.
