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CENTRAL BOARD

NOVEMBER 17, 1965

The meeting was called to order in the Ravalli Room at 8:05 p.m. by President John Ross. The minutes were approved as written.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

MSPA will be in Billings at Rocky Mountain College, November 20 and 21.

COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS

WENDTE MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD APPROVE MR. HELIKER AS A MEMBER OF STORE BOARD. SECONDED BY PEREGOY. MOTION PASSED WITH REAGOR, BEHAN, AND BAIRD ABSTAINING. WENDTE MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD APPROVE MR. FREEMAN AS A MEMBER OF STORE BOARD. SECONDED BY PEREGOY. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. BEHAN MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD APPOINT NORM CLARK TO THE LIBRARY COMMITTEE. SECONDED BY WENDTE. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. Ross relinquished the chair to Asselstine. ROSS MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD APPOINT RICK RICHTER, FERN CREEK THORNTON, ALVIN FLEHARTY, AND DUKE GILBERT TO TRAFFIC COMMITTEE. SECONDED BY WENDTE. Behan said that he would like to see this held open for awhile so that other people who were interested could be talked to. Stockamp said that these people can be put on now and some more could be appointed later since there is no limit to the number that can be appointed. MOTION PASSED WITH ANDERSON, MAXSON, NISBET, REAGOR, STOCKAMP AND WENDTE IN FAVOR; BAIRD, BEHAN, AND PEREGOY OPPOSED; AND ASSELSTINE, KITZENBERG, LANMAN, MORROW, AND WALDRON ABSTAINING.

BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Wendte said that he had talked with Dr. Browman and Phi Kappa Phi is not going to print the Grizzly Guide this year. They wanted Central Board to print it. Budget and Finance turned down the request because a listing of the campus phones will be printed when the new phones are installed. Ross said that the University will take over the printing of the Grizzly Guide next year. Wendte said that a request for a donation to the Friends of the Library was tabled for lack of information.

PLANNING BOARD

Behan introduced a by-law addition: Division I, Article V, Section 5. The president shall have the power to veto any motion before Central Board. A presidential veto may be overridden by a 2/3 veto of the total membership of Central Board. This power is quite common among other student governments. There was a question raised by Planning Board as to where this should be placed---in the by-laws or in the Constitution. BEHAN MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD ACCEPT THE PROPOSED BY-LAW ADDITION CONCERNING THE VETO POWER. SECONDED BY WENDTE. Reagor said that he felt that this should be in the Constitution. Fairley said that he did not feel that there was a need for this. Waldron said that Cromwell raised the question whether a veto power is okay unless there is a separation of the legislative body and the executive body. Waldron said that it might be better to try it in the by-laws before putting it in the Constitution. REAGOR MOVED TO AMEND THE MOTION TO ADD THE WORDS: THIS SECTION SHALL BE EFFECTIVE UNTIL SPRING ELECTIONS 1966. SECONDED BY FAIRLEY. AMENDMENT PASSED WITH ANDERSON, ASSELSTINE, BAIRD, FAIRLEY, KITZENBERG, MAXSON, NISBET, REAGOR, AND STOCKAMP IN FAVOR; BEHAN, LANMAN, MORROW, PEREGOY, WALDRON, AND WENDTE OPPOSED. THE MOTION PASSED WITH ANDERSON, BEHAN, KITZENBERG, MAXSON, NISBET, REAGOR, STOCKAMP, AND WALDRON IN FAVOR; BAIRD, FAIRLEY, LANMAN, PEREGOY,

AND WENDTE OPPOSED; AND ASSELSTINE AND MORROW ABSTAINING. Behan introduced two more by-law changes. Division II, Article XV, Section 1. This committee shall consist of two co-chairmen, appointed by Central Board by the third week of Winter Quarter, and of the camp counselors chosen Spring Quarter. Division III, Article III, Section 3. He shall receive a salary of \$30.00 a month for a period of 8 months beginning October 1. These by-law changes will be voted on next week. BEHAN MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD ACCEPT THE BY-LAW CHANGE CONCERNING THE CAMPAIGN PROCEDURES. SECONDED BY WENDTE. Division IV, Article I, Section 16. a. Signs, handbills, banners, and similiar material may be posted on trees, without damage to the trees, on lamp posts without damage to the lamp pōsts, on existing bulletin boards, on billboards or booths set up on the campus grounds, on wooden stakes driven into the ground, or to the interior walls of campus buildings or dormitories with the permission of the director of the physical plant and/or the permission of the head resident. There shall be no defacing of University property or sidewalks by the application of any kind of paint. b. All signs shall be removed from authorized spaces by the organization or individuals erecting them by 12:00 midnight before the election. c. The elections committee chairman shall acquaint the candidates with the election rules. He shall report to Central Board infractions of these rules. d. Central Board shall have the power to invalidate any candidate because of illegal campaign procedures. It shall further have the power to report to the Dean of Students for corrective action, any candidate who damages any University property during his campaign. e. Masking tape only is allowed for fixation of signs, except tacks may be used on bulletin boards, and cellophane tape on glass surfaces. However, no signs may be placed on glass doors. Perego said that he would like to see this defeated and referred to the elections committee. Ross said that he received a note from Cromwell saying that Cromwell objected to the language that was used. THE MOTION WAS DEFEATED WITH BAIRD, BEHAN, KITZENBERG, REAGOR, AND STOCKAMP IN FAVOR; ASSELSTINE, FAIRLEY, MAXSON, MORROW, NISBET, PEREGOY, AND WENDTE OPPOSED; AND ANDERSON, LANMAN, AND WALDRON ABSTAINING. Behan said that the board discussed more on reapportionment. He said that he would like to see Central Board members attend the meetings so that they will know a little about this topic before it is brought before the board. He would like to see most of the hashing done in the committee before it is presented to Central Board.

PUBLICATIONS BOARD

Archibald said that it was Pub Board's recommendation that Raenelle Maxwell be appointed as business manager of the Sentinel and that Vicki Sanders be appointed as associate editor. The by-laws would have to be waived for Sanders. BEHAN MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD ACCEPT THE RECOMMENDATION OF PUB BOARD AND ACCEPT RAENELLE MAXWELL AS BUSINESS MANAGER OF THE SENTINEL. SECONDED BY BAIRD. MOTION PASSED WITH NISBET AND STOCKAMP ABSTAINING. KITZENBERG MOVED THAT VICKI SANDERS BE ACCEPTED AS ASSOCIATE EDITOR OF THE SENTINEL AND THAT CENTRAL BOARD WAIVE THE BY-LAWS CONCERNING THE GRADE POINT. SECONDED BY MORROW. Archibald said that she was highly recommended by the editor. Reagor said he did not see why the by-laws should be waived. Behan said that the by-laws should be flexible. MOTION PASSED WITH REAGOR, ASSELSTINE, NISBET, WALDRON, ANDERSON, AND MORROW OPPOSED.

TRADITIONS BOARD

NISBET MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD ALLOCATE \$145 FOR THE FRESHMAN CHEERLEADER UNIFORMS. SECONDED BY MAXSON. Bergerson said that this cost included making them up. This request was turned down by Budget and Finance previously because the committee felt that the uniforms could be made cheaper, that it should be checked into more, and that perhaps they could be ordered through a catalog. Bergerson said that there were not any uniforms in any catalogs in Missoula and that the material is cheaper than originally asked for. Asselstine felt that Central Board should get the uniforms because it would help generate more school spirit. MOTION PASSED WITH REAGOR ABSTAINING. Bergerson said that he would like to publicly thank his committee for all it has done to stimulate school spirit. Ross also commended Traditions Board.

NEW BUSINESS

KITZENBERG MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD ADOPT THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION: Resolution to the Administration and Dorm Administrators protesting the room rates of Craig Hall and other dormitories. Whereas: Last year, a refund of \$10 was given to students living in multiple rooms. A multiple room being a room holding more students than it was designed to hold such as a double room with three students living in it. Whereas: Now, the majority of the residents of Craig Hall and others live in multiple rooms, due to the room shortage, but are not--this year--being given a refund. Whereas: We, Central Board, believe--as do the thirteen wing-chairmen of Craig Hall, and numerous other students--that a reduction in rate or a refund should be given--this year--to those who are suffering this inconvenience and injustice. SECONDED BY BAIRD. Kitzenberg said that there is not going to be a refund this year because it involves a lot of bookkeeping work and expense. Anderson said that he felt that Central Board would be overstepping its boundaries if they endorsed this. Behan said that he agreed with the resolution, but that he did not feel that it went far enough. He said that it should not just be aimed at Craig Hall, but that perhaps other dorms were involved. He felt that Central Board was within its rights. He said that he would not like to see it passed tonight, but he would like to see more work done on it. ASSELSTINE MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD TABLE THIS MOTION UNTIL MORE WORK CAN BE DONE ON IT. SECONDED BY BAIRD. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. Waldron wanted to know if these students paid for the rooms with the idea that they were paying for a double room or with the idea that they were just paying for a multiple room. Ross called this out of order.

ZCNING COMMITTEE

Behan said that the committee had talked with Mayor Dix. The petition has been referred to the Board of Review and the board has not as yet met. Mayor Dix would like to have a meeting with all the people who are interested so they can tell their opinions before the Board of Review meets.

Ross said that there will not be a meeting next Wednesday.

BEHAN MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD ADJOURN. SECONDED BY NISBET. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.
