Dr. Harold C. Urey and Dr. Franklin A. Long, alumni of the Montana State University Department of Chemistry, have been honored by the National Academy of Sciences, reports Dr. John M. Stewart, department chairman.

Dr. Urey, professor-at-large at the University of California, San Diego, has been awarded the J. Lawrence Smith Medal of the national academy "for outstanding achievement in the investigation of meteoric bodies." Dr. Urey, winner of the Nobel Prize in Chemistry in 1934, received his B. S. in chemistry from MSU in 1917 and an honorary D. Sc. from the University in 1945. He is a member of the academy.

Dr. Long, professor of chemistry at Cornell University, is one of 34 members elected to the academy this year "on the basis of distinguished and continued achievements in original research." He received B. A. and M. A. degrees in chemistry from MSU in 1931 and 1932, respectively, and a Ph. D. in physical chemistry from the University of California in 1935.
