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CENTRAL BOARD MINUTES
May 18, 1961

Absent: Adams, Bertelson, Stone

The meeting was called to order by Vice-President John Carlson in Conference Rooms 1 and 2.

WORLD UNIVERSITY SERVICE

- 1) Marcia Holmes, chairman of the committee, reported these amounts taken in: Variety Show, \$27; Meanest Professor Contest \$22.45; Dance \$41; late per tickets, \$63; dessert sacrifice, \$199; bed pushing contest, \$67. This is a total of \$332.44 with 4 groups yet to turn in money for the dessert sacrifice and \$37 to come in from the bed pushing contest. This is as much as was collected in previous years excluding the Chinese Auction.
- 2) Holmes recommended that the committee in future years be larger and include some men.

Walsh displayed the cover that will be used.

VICE-PRESIDENT'S REPORT

- 1) Carlson stated that the ticket sales for the Randy Sparks Trio was poor, although they had played at several functions for entertainment. The Trio will be guests of Joe Reber and John Datsopoulos at Flathead.
- 2) The Student Union Committee suggested having faculty talent at the College Inn, Friday at 4 pm. The Inter-scholastic Committee felt this would not be appropriate this week. A suggestion of moving the ping-pong tables to the College Inn has been made.

MOVIE PRESENTATION COMMITTEE

- 1) Marti Davis, chairman, reported that a 27 minute film with color, sound, and musical background stressing both the academic and social life of MSU was wanted. This would include the opportunity of student-faculty contact and the larger activities.
- 2) Four groups were contacted. Jon R Associates of Missoula said they could do this for \$8300 with special processing in Denver. Empire Films of Spokane asked from \$5000 to \$7000. The other two film companies were unsatisfactory. The committee now has \$1300. This has built up \$700 this year.
- 3) The list of things included in the film would be for faculty and alumnae groups as well as high school students. The setting would be of a senior looking back through his college life. The committee has seen 21 other films.
- 4) In the discussion that followed, Carroll questioned the reasons for sponsoring this film. Carlson explained that it was good publicity and under Risse's administration, Central Board allocated funds to sponsor such a movie. Questioned as to why settle for a \$5000-\$7000 film when we want good work, Browman stated the Empire Films had high ratings and did excellent work. Haarr suggested

that fraternities and sororities may contribute if Greek life were shown. Carlson said he felt we were overstressing activities. Whitelaw stated the amount of activities was unimportant as long as the narration was carried out in an academic manner.

BUDGET AND FINANCE

1) Young, business manager, reported the General Fund Balance is \$635. The deficit in the Activities not including the advance payment to Glenn Miller's Band is \$250.

2) YOUNG MOVED MORTAR BOARD RECEIVE \$200 TO PAY LOAN FROM AQUAMAIDS. SECONDED BY MOSSEY. Jones questioned whether this was a loan or a gift. Young stated that Mortar Board had done much for the campus and that this was to pay off another loan. Browman said that Mortar Board might lose national recognition if the debt continued and that Mortar would never need to come to Central Board for money again. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

3) YOUNG MOVED THAT JANE FARNUM RECEIVE \$200 TO ATTEND A GOLF TOURNAMENT IN MICHIGAN. SECONDED BY WHITE LAW. Young said we should not do this as it would deplete the general fund. Browman stated that if Central Board felt this a worthy activity, there is reserve funds to be used. He said we should be consistent and new changes in regards to minor sports could be made next year when the new athletic director came. Carlson said it was time we said "No" to minor sports until they consolidated. There was a discussion on appropriations given to the Women's Collegiate Sports and on the budget Farnum had submitted. Cogswell said the eligibility of minor sport participants should be the same as for major sports and some method of doing this should be devised. Oswald said he had sent a letter and budget to the new athletic director. The answer received was that he realized the problem and when he knew more details he would be willing to try to work out the problem with minor sports. THE MOTION PASSED WITH 5 IN FAVOR, 4 OPPOSED (HAMLIN, HAARR, MOSSEY, YOUNG), AND 2 ABSTAINING (CARROLL, OSWALD).

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT COMMITTEE

1) Leslie Shallenberger thanked Central Board for the bulletin board that would be put in the library.

2) Shallenberger reported on the bus trip of foreign students to Helena. 24 students participated in the panel discussions and tour of Helena. The Bozeman group joined with MSU. Their criticism would be to have more tours of the historical and cultural interests and sights and less of modern buildings. Shallenberger thanked Cogswell for chaperoning and Central Board for their share of paying the expense.

3) International Student Committee is now working on the orientation program for foreign students and with AWS for a Big Sister program.

DELEGATE PROJECT REPORTS

Carroll questioned the result if project reports were not turned in this week. Carlson stated delegates would be guillotined.

MEETING TIME AND PLACE

Carroll asked if some permanent time and place could be arranged. Mossey said the president reserves the room. Carlson said Thursday at 7 pm was permanent and the Silver Bow Room which is quieter, but not part of the Student Union building, might be arranged. WHITELOW MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD ADJOURN. SECONDED BY MINTEER. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.
