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CENTRAL BOARD MINUTES
October 18, 1961

Absent: Carroll

The meeting was called to order by President Denis Adams in the Silver Bow room. The minutes were approved as stated. Adams welcomed the freshmen delegates and encouraged each of them to take upon themselves one definite individual project for the year.

VICE-PRESIDENT REPORT

- 1) Carlson reported 4 faculty members and 11 students would be taking the Northern Pacific to Bellingham, Washington for the Student Union convention November 2-4. Carlson said the most exciting part of the meeting was a discussion on whether or not to take slumber coaches. Student Union thinks Bob Willard, manager of the College Inn, has done well and that his suggestion of moving the bar to the northeast corner has merit.
- 2) Carlson said Northern, Eastern, and Custer County Jr. College have declined invitations to attend Model U.N. although seven schools have accepted. Arrangements are being made for some schools to take two countries. Students will stay at the Palace Hotel and eat in the territorial rooms. Mr. Arthur Lancy, who is chairman of the U.N. for Gov. Nutter, has been invited to attend the Model U.N.
- 3) Pengelly announced that plans were completed for the Ralph Marterie Orchestra. Cost is \$1500 for the band and about \$50 for publicity. Air conditioning would be set up for the dance.
- 4) CARLSON MOVED TO ACCEPT THE MEMBERS FOR COMMITTEES AS LISTED FOR THE CENTRAL BOARD MEMBERS. SECONDED BY YOUNG. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.
- 5) CARLSON MOVED TO ACCEPT DON KINNEY AS RADIO-TV CHAIRMAN. SECONDED BY BROWMAN. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

BUDGET AND FINANCE

- 1) Young announced 200 free season tickets available at either the Lodge desk or music office were being given for the Missoula Civic Symphony concerts.
- 2) Copies of the General Fund budget were distributed and explained by Young. About \$3500 would be allocated for special appropriations during the year. This would include those groups not listed as receiving allocations at this time. Allocations have been given in the spring budget to various groups. Young hoped to call together the minor sports this year. The reserve fund from the Student Store was explained. YOUNG MOVED TO ACCEPT THE GENERAL BUDGET. SECONDED BY HAMLIN. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.
- 3) Young distributed the Budget and Finance operating policy and the criteria for groups to approach Budget and Finance.
- 4) YOUNG MOVED TO DROP MONTEGNA, PALMER, NEISSER, NOESINGER, AND GREGG FROM BUDGET AND FINANCE AS THEY DIDN'T ATTEND MEETINGS. SECONDED BY HAYNAM. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

VISITING LECTURERS

McBride announced the future speakers this quarter: Bruno Bettelheim, October 25; Laurence Thompson, October 27; John H. Franklin, November 14; Julian Hartt, December 1. Vercors for November 7 has been cancelled. Money has been allocated from Central Board and from the Alumni Association.

PLANNING COMMITTEE

Browman reported on the following topics:

- 1) Discussions on the Victory Bell had been held with Traditions Board. The best solution was to have a platform of concrete in front of the Lodge and leave the bell on the cart so it could still be pulled and rung after games. The clapper would be removed between games.
- 2) A discussion on a by-law which would enable committee chairmen to dismiss committee members after three consecutive absence from meetings was tabled.
- 3) Kaimin policies were discussed with Walsh.
- 4) Carroll's by-laws for election procedure changes were discussed. Brownman announced it would be the planning committee's policy to wait one week on discussions before making a decision.

ELECTION COMMITTEE

Whitelaw reporting for Carroll read from the Kaimin the following statistics: Cole 331, Haynam 215, Paterson 178, Wulf 145, Nichols 130, Buck 89. Cole is a two year delegate; Haynam and Paterson are one year delegates. 31.1% of the freshmen voted compared to 34% last year.

PUBLICATIONS

- 1) Grimm reported Walsh and Dugan had approached him about obtaining 6 new typewriters for the Kaimin. Present ones are state owned and Pantzer explained there is an involved system to return them to the state.
- 2) Grimm requested Holloron and Delenty be dropped from the Publications committee as both were Journalism majors of which there were two too many on the committee and both had missed meetings. CARLSON MOVED TO PASS THIS REQUEST. SECONDED BY JONES. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

LIBRARY COMMITTEE

Adams said a position is open on this committee for a student and suggested that one of the freshman delegates might be interested. One item the committee will handle this year is requests for extended library hours especially on week-ends.

ACTIVITIES BOARD

Myhre reported on the following committees:

- 1) Mueller, movies chairman, has a movie scheduled Friday and despite poor projectors would have good movies throughout the year.
- 2) Arts and Crafts has the year booked for art shows. The committee is considering selling prints of the art that is shown. Committee chairmen are going to Bellingham, Washington for new ideas on Student Union activities. Myhre questioned by-laws or incorporation of Visiting Lecturers and Public Exercises. Adams stated that they were a separate committee and not handled by Activities Board.

JUDICIAL COUNCIL

- 1) Juelfs reported the council had voted by 2/3 majority to remove any member missing three meetings.
- 2) In their last meeting Juelfs said Cogswell stated he would not send cases to Judicial Council until the council would educate the student body on social rules. Academic dishonesty was one problem Cogswell suggested Judicial Council handle. Juelfs said Abbott had been invited to the next meeting to explain the problem and extent of it.

BOB CAT-GRIZZLY RESOLUTIONS

Adams announced he had received a letter from Richardson confirming the October 29, 2 pm joint meeting. Adams suggested adding a resolution to make provision for the host school to secure tickets and seats for student government members. Browman suggested the same thing be applied for the student body. Carlson said tickets for the game were here and would be sold this year. Discussion was held on the resolution of the losing student body president losing his pants, but it was generally agreed that this was an enjoyable resolution. MINTEER MOVED TO PRESENT BROWMAN'S AND ADAMS'S SUGGESTIONS TO THE JOINT MEETING. SECONDED BY WHITELEW. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

THANKSGIVING HOLIDAY

Adams announced the Board of Deans after considering transportation difficulties and "hardship cases" had decided to give entire Wednesday as holiday rather than the afternoon as has been done. Adams said the Board of Deans wanted Central Board's endorsement and cooperation in encouraging the student body to attend classes Monday and Tuesday and the following Monday as this was contingent to the continuance of the extended holiday. Carlson said he felt such a resolution would do no good. It is the students who lose from missing classes and Carlson added his typical home-grown sagacity "let the hard knocks fall where they might". Carlson stated he had many acquaintances who missed classes throughout the quarter and it was ludicrous to get nervous about their attendance for two days. Cogswell stated the university was not obligated to give more than Thursday as a holiday, but realized Montana's transportation problem. Abbott added that although there was a certain amount of cutting, it was demoralizing to not have half a class attending. Some discussion was held by Jones and Pantzer on the responsibility of Central Board if classes were cut as the result of the extended holiday. Pantzer explained the possibility of shortened holidays was not a "threat" and the Board of Deans had not made any decision if such an event would occur. There was discussion as to the adverse effects of a formal suggestion by Central Board and other possibilities. Kaimin coverage was considered and Walsh said he would not censor his reporter. Osterheld said that the announcement could be in appreciation for the thoughtful act of the Board of Deans. After some

revision WHITELAW SUBTLELY MOVED THAT CENTRAL BOARD EXPRESS APPRECIATION TO THE BOARD OF DEANS ON BEHALF OF THE STUDENT BODY FOR THE EXTENDED THANKSGIVING HOLIDAY IN RECOGNITION OF THE PROBLEMS STUDENTS HAVE IN TRANSPORTATION. SECONDED BY HAMLIN. Haarr said it was imperative to include an amendment. With some aid JONES MOVED THAT STUDENTS SHOULD REALIZE THAT FUTURE EXTENDED THANKSGIVING HOLIDAYS MIGHT BE JEOPARDIZED BY ABSENCE FROM CLASSES ON MONDAY AND TUESDAY, AND THE FOLLOWING MONDAY. SECONDED BY BERTELSON. AMENDMENT PASSED (12-3) WITH CARLSON, MOSSEY, AND YOUNG OPPOSED AND TATSUYAMA ABSTAINING. THE MAIN MOTION PASSED (12-2) WITH BROWMAN, CARLSON OPPOSED AND YOUNG AND TATSUYAMA ABSTAINING.

BYLAW CORRECTIONS

Browman said there were three corrections to be made in the bylaws. Division II, Article IX, Section 2, concerning the Homecoming-Alumni Relations Committee needed to be added; Division III, Article I, Section 6a, concerning a Kaimin photography editor needed to be added; Division V, Article 2, Section 3, concerning the Student-Faculty coordinator needed to be added. Adams suggested Browman and Leuthold make necessary changes.

FRESHMEN BEANIES

Whitelaw asked what had been done about the freshmen beanies discussion. Browman said the committee thought it might have been a passing concern of one delegate and asked if Whitelaw would be willing to present his views to Traditions Board. Whitelaw said he definitely would.

CARLSON MOVED THE MEETING ADJOURN. SECONDED BY MINTEER. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.
