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DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI TO BE HONORED AT UM HOMECOMING

MISSOULA—

Four exceptional individuals have been selected by The University of Montana Alumni Association to receive Distinguished Alumni Awards during Homecoming festivities on Friday, Sept. 28.

The winners will be honored during a 5 p.m. ceremony beginning in the University Center Ballroom. The public is invited to attend.

2007 Distinguished Alumni Awards will go to Shane Bishop, national producer, Dateline NBC; Paul Caine, retired Navy aviator and commercial real estate consultant; Al Kelley, professor emeritus of mathematics, University of California, **Santa Cruz**; and Harley Lewis, director of development, University of Arkansas.

Bishop, a **Conrad** native, graduated from the UM School of Journalism's Department of Radio-Television in 1986.

He began his career as a reporter at KPAX-TV in **Missoula** and went on to produce at stations in **Philadelphia** and **New York City** before becoming a Dateline producer in 1994.

Bishop covered the World Trade Center and Oklahoma City bombings, the Columbine massacre, the 9/11 attacks and Hurricane Katrina. He has received two national Emmy awards

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and was a member of the NBC team that won the 2007 Alfred I. duPont-Columbia University Broadcast Award for coverage of Hurricane Katrina.

He also was among Dateline producers who received the Sigma Delta Chi award for outstanding breaking news coverage of the 9/11 attacks.

He is married to Erika Colness Bishop, a 1989 graduate of the UM radio-television department who manages an HD production company.

Caine, a 1956 business administration graduate, grew up in **Miles City**. He had an illustrious 24-year career as a Navy aviator. In his early service he was credited with 13 helicopter rescues, and he worked with search and rescue operations in the Gulf of Tonkin during the Vietnam War.

After more than 80 combat missions, Caine was selected as a recovery pilot for the Apollo 4 spacecraft. He also was a combat squadron, air group and air wing commander.

Since 1980 Caine has worked in international business. In 1996 he was named managing director of NAI Global, a commercial real estate consulting company.

Caine was a founder of NAI NAFTA, a leader in labor and trade corridor studies for major global companies, which helped create many thousands of jobs in NAFTA countries. He recently joined NAI Mexico as executive managing director. He and his wife, Nancy Schilling Caine, also a 1956 UM graduate, live in **San Diego**.

After receiving a UM forestry degree, Kelley went on to earn a doctoral degree in mathematics at the University of California, **Berkeley**. He was a forester in Oregon and then served as a U.S. Air Force radar officer.

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Kelley worked as a smokejumper during summers while attending UM and made his first trip to California in 1954, landing by parachute to fight a fire there.

While teaching at Berkeley in 1964, Kelley discovered and named the center manifold, and he was among the first to recognize the importance of computers in mathematical research.

He is the co-author of three widely used college textbooks on the C programming language.

An avid outdoorsman, he and his wife, Carole, travel extensively.

Lewis, who grew up in **Butte**, earned a bachelor's degree in 1963 and a master's degree in 1964 at UM. He was UM's head track and cross country coach from 1966 to 1978 and was selected Big Sky Conference Coach of the Year nine times.

While serving as director of athletics at UM from 1975 to 1989, Lewis oversaw construction of Washington-Grizzly Stadium. From 1989 to 1994, he served as NCAA assistant director of championships.

Lewis was inducted into the Grizzly Sports Hall of Fame in 1998. He has been director of development at the University of Arkansas since 1997 and was instrumental in its successful \$1 billion campaign completed in 2005.

He and his wife, Beverly, live in **Fayetteville, Ark.**

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
