Central Board Minutes
September 29, 1960

Absent: Lee, Whitelaw, Oswald.

The meeting was called to order by President Paul Ulrich in the Silver Bow room. The minutes were read and corrected. ~~Alumni~~ was misspelled throughout the minutes.

Ulrich reported from the Congressional Record on the stand taken on the allegiance oath on the Federal Loans.

BUDGET & FINANCE

Bon reported a recommendation from Budget & Finance; that Mr. Eversole and the Music Department be given \$900. for 12 uniforms. Mr. Eversole had originally requested \$1125. for 15 uniforms. The anticipated band of 80 members was far below the actual enrollment of 97. The band now has only 92 usable uniforms and they want enough extra so that each member will have a fairly well fitting suit. Mr. Eversole said that the band's budget requests for this year is lower when compared to last year, -1.65% including travel requests as compared to 2.2% last year. Having no football tours is saving \$750. The band intended to ask for 15 uniforms in May, 1960, and for 15 more in May, 1961. He estimated the band to have 115-120 members by next fall. Eversole also requested permission to call Stansberry in Kansas City, Mo. so that the uniforms will be in use for the BYU game, Oct. 22. Carlson inquired about the drop out rate during the year. Eversole answered that the band has about a 3% variance either way since of the 97 members at least 76 are music majors and are required to take band.

Johnson asked if the student teachers are included in the membership. Eversole said that 5 student teachers will be coming back in October and that they are included in the 97 members.

Bon reported that he had checked with Dundas in the Field House and that there is \$1200 from ~~last year's~~ general fund that has not been transferred. Central Board would be free to use this. 1959-60

Stone asked the reasoning behind Budget and Finance's cut on the request. Bon answered that the committee understood that the uniforms came in groups of 6.

Eversole replied that the grouping was only for the first 6; the rates were reduced for all uniforms if more than 6 were ordered.

Datsopoulos moved that Central Board allocate \$1125 to the band for new uniforms; and that Mr. Eversole be allowed to call Kansas City to expedite the delivery. Motion seconded by Stone. Bon moved to amend the motion so that the money would come from the 1959-60 general fund. Amendment seconded by Carlson.

The amendment carried unanimously. The motion carried 9½ to 0, with Bon and Johnson abstaining. Eversole commended Jack Griffith on the 1960 Homecoming.

PUBLICATIONS BOARD

Frank Walsh reported meeting Sept. 29; he recommended a bylaw change for the policy of the Kaimin, that Div. 3, Art. I, Sec 6, be changed to four associate editors with the fourth editor to be in charge of photography. He said that in the past the editor had to take all of the pictures for Kaimin usage. Stone inquired whether this person would need journalism training. Walsh replied that he might need courses in reporting and editorials.

Colness asked how the Kaimin handled the situation in the past. Walsh answered that the public demands more pictures and that the Kaimin would need someone constantly on the job.

Rolf Olson, Kaimin editor, said that the Kaimin struggled last year and that the paper suffered. With the additional help the paper could do a better job. Stone suggested that a wider selection could be had for the photographer without the restrictions. Olson had no objections but added that a reporting course would be helpful. Walsh said that since the Kaimin is a class in the Journalism School the editors should be in that school.

Colness moved that the word three be changed to four in Div. 3, Art. I, Sec. 6, and that the additional editor would be in charge of photography. Seconded by Morris. Carlson asked how many are on the paid staff of the Kaimin. Walsh answered that the salaries of the six persons came to \$120 per year.

Motion was defeated 5-4½, with Datsopoulos, Colness, Dodge, Morris, and Stone in favor and Mossey, Bon, Johnson, Carlson, and Ulvila opposed.

Carlson suggested hiring an assistant editor in charge of news photography but without the Journalism prerequisites. He moved the changing of the by laws to read: Div. 3, Art. I, Sec. 6 a.

A photography editor shall be chosen at least two weeks prior to the end of each winter quarter, on the basis of his qualifications for the position. This person shall receive \$15 per month for a two month period to begin April 1, and for a six month period to begin October 1.

Seconded by Ulvila and passed unanimously.

Walsh said that the Kaimin would run ads for the photography editor applications, assistant editor for the Kaimin and a photography editor for the Sentinel. These personnel will be chosen next Thurs. at 3:00. Applications will come to Walsh in form of a letter.

VICE PRESIDENT

Activities--Datsopoulos reported the last ASMSU mixer to be a success. Publicity for Roger Williams will start Monday, October 3. Williams will be here October 16. Beach parties and popcorn parties are being planned. The Hi Lo ~~can be booked~~ for November 18, which is a Friday night, for \$2000. They will give two concerts, with an intermission of 45 minutes during each. Each concert will be 1-1 1/2 hrs. long. Morris moved to accept the Hi Lo's contract and to go ahead with plans. Motion seconded by Johnson. Motion carried 11-0, with Stone abstaining.

Student Union--Datsopoulos reported the the College Inn will be open from 7:30-12:00 p.m. on week ends and from 9:00-10:30 on week days. The Student Union Convention will be held in Davis, California, October 28-30, 1960.

Applications for ASMSU committees and chairmen will be at the Lodge Desk Monday. All committees will be open to new members. The following committees have vacancies in chairmanship: Student Faculty Coordinator; Visiting Lecturers; Activities Committees, Movies, Dance, Special Events, Games, Arts & Crafts; Radio-TV and a Clerical Assistant to be paid \$1.00 per hour. Ulrich expressed his wish to approve committeemen Saturday morning. Central Board will be meeting Sat. Oct. 8, at 9:30. Announcements will be made in the Kaimin Tuesday.

Ulrich reported that Homecoming was proceeding on schedule. Griffith will have full report after the proceedings.

Datsopoulos commenced Denis Adams and his work on Traditions Board.

TRADITIONS BOARD

Adams reported that 24 girls tried out for cheerleader this fall. The results as chosen by Traditions Board and recommended to Central Board are: for cheerleaders Louie Garcia, Dick Austin, Gary Fish, Mary Lou Johnson, Donna Snyder, and Peggy Josephson; for Pom Pom girls Karen Upshaw, Susie Frizelle, Helen Ferrlan, Sandy Shaffer, and Kathy Spittler.

Colness moved the acception of T-Board's recommendations. Seconded by Johnson, and carried unanimously.

Adams said that every ordered freshmen beanie had been sold and that the \$317 profit would be split among Traditions Board, Bear Paws and Spurs.

Grizzlie Growlers have been reorganized. 25 freshmen came to the first meeting; these people are to be in charge of pulling the Victory Bell in the parade and

to put banners and pom poms up for Homecoming. The bear mascot will again attend the football game. The bon fire will begin after the torch parade, Friday, Sept. 30. Dick Austin will be master of ceremonies, and the football team will be present. Fox cards will be sold on campus this next week.

APPOINTMENTS

Ulrich announced that Dr. Newburn has recommended Mr. Troy Crowder as faculty advisor to Publications Board. Johnson moved the acceptance of Mr. Crowder. Seconded by Dodge; carried unanimously.

Ed Chinsky has recommended Malcolm Broatch and Don Russell for hold over members and David Sulc and William Gilbert for new members to Intermural Sports Board. Johnson moved the acceptance of said members. Seconded by Colness and carried unanimously.

Jerry Agen has expressed a need for a secretary to handle correspondence for Public Relations Area. He has recommended Sue Cadwell. Johnson moved the acceptance of Sue Cadwell. Seconded by Morris, and carried unanimously.

MISCELLANEOUS

Ulrich read a letter from the Friens of the Library in which they requested the presence of a Central Board member at their next meeting, to be held Friday, Sept. 30, at 5:00. Tours of the library are to be held Friday from 3:30-4:30 p.m. At 4:30 A. B. Guthrie and Dorothy Johnson will speak. Officers are to be elected at the meeting. Carlson and Ulvila volunteered to go.

Dan Bieri reported on the progress of Store Board. The Student Store is not yet incorporated due to not having the results of tax exemption query. A downtown lawyer has written a letter to the Bureau of Internal Revenue but has not received an answer. This appears to be the last stumbling block.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.
