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Central Board Minutes
November 18, 1959

Absent: Stone

The meeting was called to order in the Silver Bow Room by President Ed Risse.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Risse said that he had received another notice about the 1960 Intercollegiate Winter Carnival. He said that if no one contacted him within the next few days he would notify them that we were uninterested in participating in the carnival.

In regards to the ROTC situation Risse said Dean Lory, Chairman of the Curriculum Committee, would bring the student's proposal before the sub-committee in charge of requirements. Risse said that President Newburn had suggested that we delay action on the matter for a while as it is a nation-wide question, and we should see what other schools decide about the matter.

Risse said that three Central Board delegates still had not turned in information for Hometown News stories.

The minutes were corrected as follows:

Meyer was present at the last meeting; the question mark in the last sentence of the minutes was deleted; and Felicia Hardison is secretary of Public Relations Committee, not Publicity Committee.

October 7, 1959 Minutes:

Under Budget & Finance, "and will be included in next year's general budget" stricken and "Next year the ASMSU budget for non-athletics will be based on \$7 rather than the \$5 that it is this year." be added for clarification.

October 28, 1959 Minutes:

Under Budget & Finance in the paragraph concerning the music department; in the sentence "Hansen moved that this be allowed" add "from the special fee increase fund."

Risse announced that next week's meeting will be on Tuesday at 4:00 because of the Thanksgiving vacation.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Adams moved that Carol Cooper be appointed to Planning Board. Bradley seconded. Passed 17-0. Adams also moved that the following people from Homecoming Committee be put on the following committees:

Romstad seconded, Passed 17-0.

BUDGET & FINANCE

Joseph said that the MSU Ballet Company would like to go on tour. She said that they would need approximately \$375; that the troupe of 20 people, taking a small bus, would go on various weekends to Butte, Bozeman, Livingston, and Billings, covering about 800 miles. The \$375 would cover expenses at \$.45 a mile. No specific dates have been set, as the towns require that the group have their travel expenses guaranteed before setting these dates. Hansen moved that Central Board approve the MSU Ballet Company expenses of \$.45 a mile from the Special Fund if their schedule of dates and mileage meets with Central Board's approval. Meyer seconded. Passed 17-0.

Cogswell said he felt there should be some co-ordinating committee to decide which public relations representatives should go to what towns. He said he believed Pub-Travel Committee had handled this at one time. Risse said that the Dean of the Music School was now in charge of the matter. He also said that Public Relations Committee is making a survey of towns around the state to see what is effective in the way of publicity.

OLD BUSINESS

Kirk Jacobson, President of IFC, asked who was in charge of pairing living groups for such activities as Homecoming floats, WUS Ugly Pair, etc. He asked that it be kept with IFC and Panhellenic Council. Dugdale said that the Dean of Students should handle this matter, since it included all-University functions. Bradley suggested that Homecoming Committee handle the matter. Dugdale said he would be glad to be in charge of this duty. He said that the houses were paired by size, the big with the small. The dorms were spaced on the list so that they would not be working together; each dorm would be teamed with a fraternity or sorority. Living groups will alternate in the size of group they work with. Each time there is a function one side of the list will be moved down one line, rotating the list. Dugdale said he would bring a complete report to the next meeting.

Ron Simon, Chairman of Traditions Board, gave the following answers to Adams' report of last week. Simon said that all the minutes from his meetings were in now, and that the reason they were late was that Karen Moore, secretary of T Board, had been unable to attend the meetings and had had to collect the notes from the temporary secretary and compile them. Concerning the Pep Rally, Simon said he had obtained 60 burlap bags and lumber and had provided torches to the sororities and fraternities for the torch parade. He said he had seen the Foresters and told them how to stack the trees, but that this had not been done properly and that he had taken members from his and a neighboring fraternity and had stacked the trees. Simon said that the MSU marching band had been informed of the proper time and place to appear, and that he had even asked them to be early. He said that he wasn't aware that he was responsible for cleaning up the bonfire mess. He said that the University had done this. He said that he felt it was a fairly good Pep Rally.

In regard to the picking of Cheerleaders and Pom Pom Girls, Simon said that the decision was released to the Kaimin before the approval of Central Board because one of the members was on the Kaimin staff and was just doing her job. He said that he was unaware that Central Board had to approve the Traditions Board choices.

In regard to being late to the meetings, Simon said that T Board meetings were held Wednesday night for the convenience of the members, not so that members would be out in time for Central Board. He said he wasn't aware that he was supposed to attend Central Board.

Simon said that all the money from train tickets is in now. He said the total amount wasn't turned promptly over to the Business Office deliberately. He turned in \$900 and kept the rest for change from tickets and money coming in. In reply to the accusation that he had not turned in a financial report to Mr. Dundas, Simon said that Mr. Dundas should send him a report; that no report was necessary from T Board to Dundas.

Simon said that he felt the train to Bozeman has been handled properly, and that everyone who had wanted to go had had the chance. He said members of T Board and Spurs and Bearpaws had sold tickets. He said that the reason tickets had not been on sale the Monday and Tuesday two weeks before the Bozeman game was that the printer had failed to have the ticket ready.

Simon said that T Board had voted not to try to get a bear mascot because such a project would entail too much responsibility and work. Bradley said that the letter asking Simon to look into this matter was sent to him and that he had not received it until he went home at the end of the summer. Simon said that he had been at fault at not seeing that the T Board booklets were handed out sooner than the Homecoming SOS. He said he felt they had had good use, however, as the Student Body and alumni sometimes didn't know the songs.

Simon said that this was an answer to the accusations listed in last week's Central Board minutes. He said he found out about the controversy through the Kaimin and felt that the whole matter was handled poorly. He said that if other committee chairmen had to worry about this sort of thing happening he felt there would be a lack of cooperation and even resignations from these people.

Risse said that if figures from the Field House were correct, ASMSU had lost almost \$300 on the Bozeman train. Simon said that tickets amounting to \$100 and change up to \$80 had not yet been turned in. Adams apologized for the manner in which the matter was brought up. He said that he had brought up the cheerleader issue after it had been discussed because it had helped create the over-all situation. He explained that in order to run 14 committees efficiently it was necessary to have the minutes of these committees in promptly.

Adams asked Simon about notes sent to him from Ryan and Dundas. Simon said that he had not received any communications from these people. Bradley said that often mail is put in the wrong box and that possibly these notes had been misplaced. Risse read a memo from Jack Ryan in which Ryan asked where he could find Simon. Ryan said that either Simon wasn't getting his messages or he wasn't paying attention. Risse said that if Simon would turn in his minutes he (Risse) could help when he received notes like this. He said that he didn't like to get notes like this because it showed that in spite of loyal committees and many meetings, not much was being accomplished.

Simon said he had not heard anything about Miss University from Jack Ryan and that the Kaimin reported T Board's activities the day after a meeting. Adams said that Simon should have known that cheerleaders and Pom Pom Girls had to be approved by Central Board as the rule was in the By-laws. Adams said he had been getting relative cooperation from the other chairmen and that he had contacted Simon personally on several occasions. Risse said that it was not the responsibility of T Board to decide whether or not to have a bear, but to make available to Central Board all possibilities of obtaining a bear.


