Lucius E. Woods, Denver, Colo., attorney, will be the speaker at the annual Barristers Ball, sponsored by the Montana Student Bar Association, Gary L. Beiswanger, president, announced.

Judges, lawyers, law professors and law students, and their wives, will attend the dinner dance, slated Saturday at 7 p. m. at the Missoula Elks Club, Beiswanger said.

Woods, a partner in the Denver firm of Holme, Roberts, More and Owen, is an active member of the Colorado Bar Association World Peace through Law Committee. His interest in this topic will make his talk Saturday especially timely since the United States will celebrate Law Day on May 1, Beiswanger commented.

His presence in San Francisco as a naval officer at the time of the United Nations Charter Conferences in 1945 sparked Woods' interest in international law and in the problems related to building an international legal structure capable of preserving world order, Beiswanger added.

Woods received B. S. and LL. B. degrees from Columbia University. After Navy service from 1943 to 1946, he returned to New York to practice law. He has resided in Denver since 1951.
