MISSOULA WILL BE SITE
OF 1973 HOME EC CONVENTION

MISSOULA--

Missoula has been selected as the site of the 1973 Montana Home Economics Association Annual Convention, announced Mrs. Sara Steensland, chairman of the Department of Home Economics at the University of Montana.

Mrs. Steensland recently met in Helena with Miss Flora Martin of the State Department of Vocational Education, and Miss Marion Moline, convention program chairman, who is with the Montana Cooperative Extension Service, to plan for the Feb. 23-24 meeting.

Formal sessions during the convention will be at the Village Motor Inn.

Commenting on the annual meeting, Mrs. Steensland said: "Since 1973 is such an important legislative year to Montanans, the convention will reflect this concern. Convention theme is 'Motivation for Involvement,' the same as the theme selected for the national conventions in June. Included in the program will be sessions on legislation affecting children and youth, textile legislation, and women's liberation and the home economist, all adapted to Montana."

Guest speakers will include Miss Sandra Muckelston, assistant dean of the UM School of Law; Dr. Maxine Johnson, director of the UM Bureau of Business and Economic Research; Dr. Maureen F. Ullrich, assistant professor of management in the UM School of Business Administration, and Mrs. Emma Briscoe, an associate professor of home economics at UM.
