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Missoula Wins Track and Field Meet

Prizes Will Be Awarded To Event Winners Tonight In the Men's Gymnasium

Large Assortment of Cups, Medals and Banners Will Be Presented; Scholarships Given by the State Board of Education Go to Essay, Debate and Declamation Winners

Athletes, speakers, actors and writers—the best of the high school students in Montana—will assemble tonight at 8:15 o'clock in the men's gymnasium to receive their cups, their medals and their prizes. Missoula firms, local and state organizations, and individual donors assist the State University in offering awards to the high school students who have shown their superiority. Prizes offered to the athletes include five cups, 76 medals and ribbons and an individual prize to the high point winner of the meet.

Other prizes, including those offered in declamation, essay, debate, journalism and the Little Theater tournament, consist of 10 medals, six cups, four scholarships, four banners, a cash award of \$25, and expenses paid for the group winning the Little Theater contest.

Two Butte Players Break Golf Record

Merhar Wins Tourney With Skedd Placing Second

Two Butte boys broke the course record for the second nine holes in taking first and second in the interscholastic golf tournament. Rudy Merhar, two strokes under Skedd after yesterday's round, came back this morning to shoot a 39 and 35 to win, two strokes up.

Merhar now holds the course record on the second nine which had been a 38. Skedd, in taking second place, broke the record with a par 36. Merhar's score was 42, 45, 39 and 35, totaling 161. Skedd turned in scores of 43, 42, 42 and 36, totaling 163. Merhar in shooting 161 tied the interscholastic record set by Magner, Malta, last year. This is the second year Merhar has won the tournament, taking top place in 1930 and second in 1931.

Third place went to Clarke of Helena, who took 175 strokes. Anderson, Missoula, and Cook, Missoula, placed fourth and fifth with scores of 180 and 197, respectively. Scores of others who finished are: Barer, Bozeman, 205; Clapp, Missoula, 217, and Johnston, Terry, 231.

Wilda Parker, Gallatin, Takes First In Girls' Section and Baker, Fergus, Wins Boys'

Wilda Parker, Gallatin county high school, giving "The Flyleaf in the Book of Disillusion" by Grace Stone Coates, won first place in the girls' section of the annual interscholastic declamatory contest held last night in Main hall auditorium. Her award is a gold medal and a scholarship to the State University. Arthur Baker, Fergus county high school, giving "The Congo" by Vachel Lindsey, was the winner of first place in the boys' section. A gold medal, known as the Judge Asa Duncan medal, and a scholarship to the State University are his awards.

Catherine Dougherty of Butte Central (girls) high school will receive a silver medal for second place. She gave "Steel" by Sewell P. Wright. Thelma Wold of Harlem, who recited "At the County Fair" by Frances Jolly, placed third and will receive a bronze medal. A blue ribbon is the award for fourth place, which goes to Lola Bernard, Butte Public high school. "Mothers of Men" by Gordon Morris was her selection. Fayne Laswell, Shelby, placed fifth with "The Show Must Go On" by Anne Fuller and receives a red ribbon as her award.

Donald Valiton, Powell county high school, speaking "The Home Talent Rehearsal" by Wade, will receive the silver medal for second place in the boys' contest. The bronze medal for third place goes to Lee Smith, Rudyard, speaking "Midshipman Easy" by Sylvia C. Bates.

O'MALLEY OF BUTTE SETS ONLY RECORD OF INTERSCHOLASTIC

Butte High School Takes Second Place With 27 3-7 Points; Flathead Third With 23 and Custer County Fourth With 15; Grattan and Lundy, Missoula, O'Malley Lead

One record was smashed and one tied as Missoula county high school romped through the Twenty-ninth Interscholastic Track and Field Meet with 36 points. Bob O'Malley, dash man from Butte, tied with Grattan and Lundy both of Missoula, for the individual point winner's position, with 10 points each. He established the only new record of the day, running the 100-yard dash in 9.9 seconds. Later he led the field to the tape in the 220-yard dash. Grattan took two firsts, the shot put and the broad jump, and Lundy took third in the broad jump, second in the low hurdles and third in the high hurdles.

Butte, victor last year, accumulated 27 3-7 points for second place, mainly through the efforts of four men in track events. Missoula's main strength lay in the field events.

The Grizzly R. O. T. C. battalion marched on the field at 1:45 o'clock, where it drew up to platoon front while bombs burst in the air. The band played "Up With Montana" and "The Star Spangled Banner." The student troops were reviewed by C. H. Clapp, president of the State University; Major G. L. Smith, professor of military tactics at the State University; Student Adjutant William Boone and J. E. Murphy, state purchasing agent.

A near-capacity crowd of about 2,500 track fans were gathered in the stands as George Varnell pulled the trigger for the seventeenth year on Dornblaser field. The heat-bathed track looked fast. A hot sun was deadened frequently in the cloud-patched sky.

O'Malley Sets Record
Bob O'Malley, Butte high school, from his standing start, smashed Roy Peden's 1931 100-yard dash record in 9.9 seconds, leading the pack by three yards. G. Davis, Missoula county high school, off to a slow start, rushed into second place at the tape. O'Malley's time was not unexpected—he covered the distance yesterday in 10 flat.

Leading all the way except in the first half of the last lap of the mile run, Jack Rose, Flathead county, sprinted gamely for 200 yards for first place. G. Arrington, Fromberg, came out of the mass to take second, also finishing with a tremendous drive. Bob Speck, Great Falls, always well up with the pack, placed third, coming from fifth position on the last lap.

C. Phillips, Dutton high school, was spiked on the second turn of the second lap on the mile run. He limped around the distance and was carried into the gymnasium with legs filled with clinders.

G. Davis, Missoula county, edged out M. Popovich, Butte high school, in the high hurdles in the record-tying time of 16.2 seconds. In tying Chester Maple's record, established in 1926, Davis was barely inches ahead of the Mining City hurdler. L. Lundy, another Missoula entrant, topped the sticks in third place, not more than a foot behind his team-mate.

Pulling out of a box on the last lap of the 880-yard run, J. Smith, Butte high school, turned on the speed and passed three leaders to take the race in 2:07.6. A. Dudaek, Anaconda, passed F. Chamberlain, Jefferson county, 10 yards from the tape to take second by a few inches. C. McNorton, Missoula county high school, a favorite in the race, stumbled on his initial start. After getting up he could not overtake the field despite a courageous attempt.

During the javelin preliminaries, Monte Reynolds, State University football player, was injured slightly as a spear accidentally struck him.

Tom Egan Wins
Tom Egan, Flathead county, who left the Polson hospital this morning where he had been confined with injuries after an automobile accident yesterday, won the javelin with a toss of 162 feet 8 inches. Ray Olsen, Park county, captured second with a throw four feet short of the leader.

A. Brownell, Gallatin county, taking the lead at the first turn, spun around the quarter-mile track in 53.2 seconds. C. Elliott, Lincoln county, galloped in second, nine feet short of the Bozeman leader, overtaking R. Bennion, another Gallatin county product, 50 yards from the finish.

Flathead county high school jumped into a tie for second place with Butte at 16 points with a victory in the mile run. Gallatin, with a first and third in the mile, moved into fifth place from a zero standing yesterday. At the end of the mile Gallatin had eight points.

O'Malley Wins Again
With a peculiar hop on the start, O'Malley of Butte romped through the 220-yard dash finals in 22.6 seconds. H. Botterud, Park county, about five yards behind the husky Butte flash, finished second. C. McCauley and James Dunn, both of Custer county, finished in third and fourth places, bringing the Cowboys into a tie with Park county with 10 points.

With a perfect stride, Popovich of Butte strode over the low sticks in 26.4 seconds, seven yards in the lead over L. Lundy, Missoula county. C. Hansman, Flathead county, was in third place.

R. Grattan, Missoula county, leaped 21 feet 4 1/2 inches in the broad jump for a first place for the meet winners, clinching the meet victory.

Seattle, Wash., May 7.—(Special)—There is an old saying that "all roads lead to Rome" but a carload of forestry students from the State University of Montana at Missoula decided that the age-old adage was right in one respect in that all roads do lead to "room" but that not all terminate in Seattle.

The students, who stopped here while en route on their annual 4,000-mile inspection tour of the Pacific northwest, were lost for nine hours between Spokane and Seattle. The three-car caravan travelling west on the main transcontinental highway lost a third of the party. Upon discovery of the loss the other two cars back tracked approximately one hundred miles, inquiring as they went at all the gasoline stations along the way as to the whereabouts of the lost machine. Having no luck the seekers decided that the wanderers must have taken a new route to the Pacific, not

being satisfied with the Lewis and Clark expedition charts.

It was late afternoon when the party held a reunion on the summit of the Cascade range, far from the originally planned meeting place. When asked if they were lost they replied that they were just seeking the State of Washington and that they knew where they were all the time.

The error occurred when the last car made the mistake of turning onto the Wenatchee road instead of the Ellensburg highway. Other members of the party have dubbed the youthful explorers "the Rover Boys."

After spending the night here the men continued on their trip, touring the Olympian peninsula.

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Graduate Teaches In Chinese School

**Arnoldson Has Letter From Richard
Underwood, Now at Kiangsi**

Mrs. Louise Arnoldson of the Department of Foreign Languages, has received a letter from a Montana graduate of 1923 who is now teaching English in the Kuling American school in Kuling, Kiangsi province, China. He is Richard Underwood of Absarokee, who took his bachelor's degree here as an English major.

Underwood says in his letter, "The school is interesting. Most of the students are the children of missionaries. Besides the main building—containing classrooms, dining room and service

quarters, together with a dormitory for 100 children, there are four bungalows. I am housemaster of one of these—the only one being operated at present—and I have direct responsibility for the life and activities of the older boys—although, of course, the physical education is directed by someone else. I teach English and Latin; we have a German woman from Munich teaching French! Next year, when we secure a good Latinist, I

shall have charge of all the English in the school."

Underwood, after graduating, immediately secured a position in the

Boone College Central China University, Wuchang, China, and with the exception of a year's leave spent in this country, he has been teaching

there until transferred to the Kuling position.

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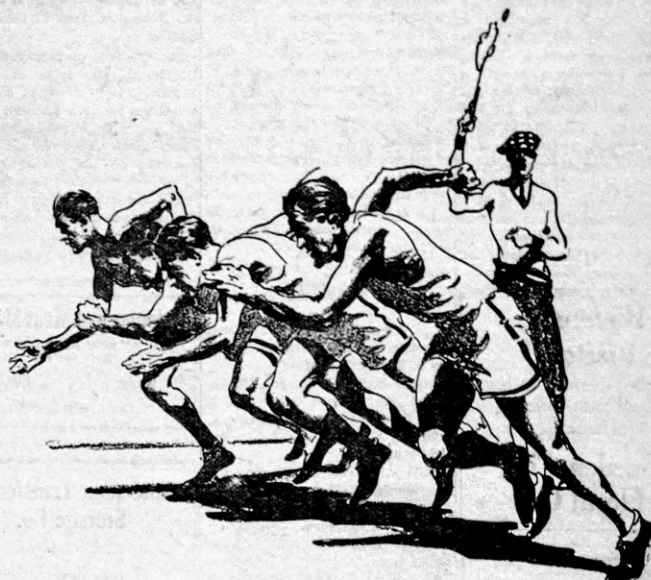
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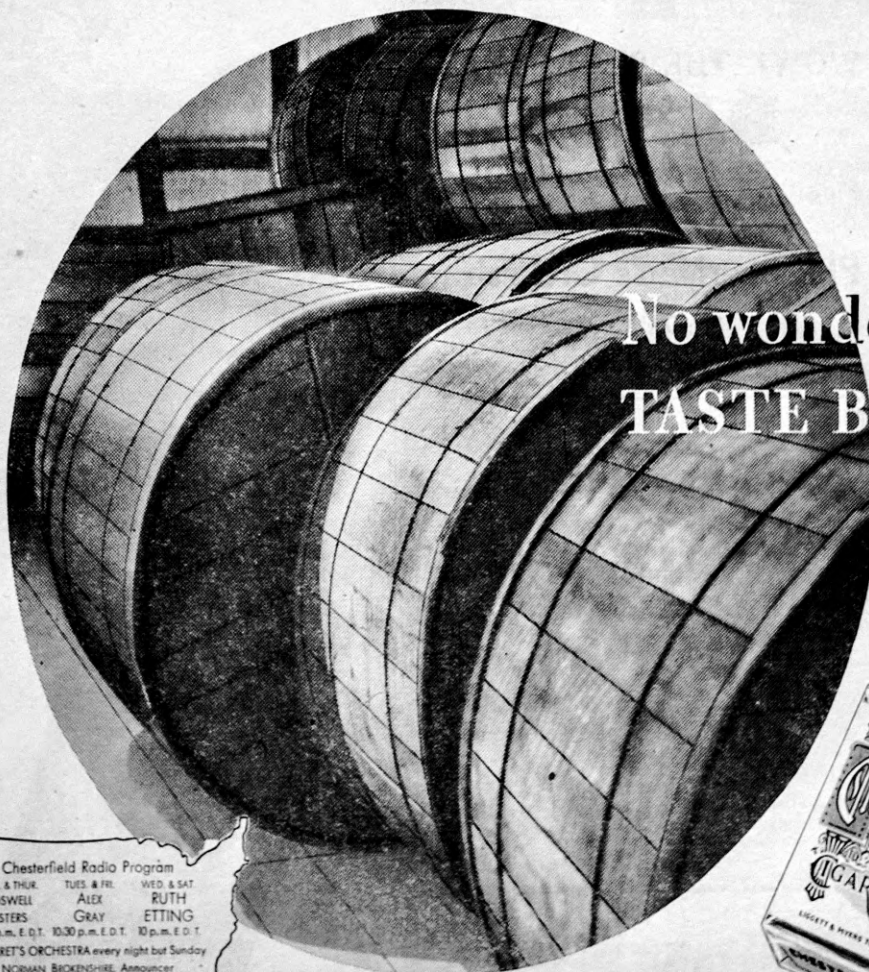
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Ten Teams Compete In Third Play Day
