AUSTRIAN REPRESENTATIVE'S LECTURE  
TO OPEN PHOTO EXHIBIT MONDAY AT UM

MISSOULA--

Guenter Fruehwirth, deputy director of the Austrian Institute in New York City, will present a survey of Austrian history from the 1930s to the present Monday (April 22) at the University of Montana during a lecture opening a photographic document exhibit entitled "Austrian Resistance Against Nazi Tyranny--1938-1945."

Monday's lecture, which is open to the public without charge, will be at 3 p.m. in the Main Lobby of the new UM Library. The exhibit, also open to the public, will be shown in the Library lobby through May 5.

While he is on campus Monday, Fruehwirth also will lecture on Austrian history to UM students in a western civilization course.

Born and educated in Vienna, Fruehwirth received his doctorate in law at the University of Vienna in 1964. He has been deputy director of the Austrian Institute in New York in 1968 and he is a former fellow of the Salzburg Seminar in American Studies.

The lecture and exhibit are sponsored by the UM Departments of Foreign Languages and History; Documentary Archives of the Austrian Resistance, Vienna, and the Austrian Institute, New York.

Dr. Horst Jarka, UM professor of foreign languages, is lecture and exhibit coordinator.
