<u>Course description</u>: An overview of the description, interpretation, and evaluation of visual art as practiced in the discipline of art criticism. Both traditional and postmodern critical approaches to art will be considered with an emphasis on contemporary art criticism. Students will read a range of past and present art critics and write several examples of art criticism based on direct observation of contemporary art works.

## Learning Objectives:

- Develop improved observation and analysis of art
- Comprehend and use various interpretive perspectives
- Develop and apply aesthetic evaluative criteria to contemporary art
- Become familiar with contemporary artists and art works through first-hand viewing and careful reading of art criticism
- Improve communication skills through writing responses to Critical Thinking Response prompts, and writing and revising three 5-page papers

## Additional Language Required by University of Montana University-wide Program-level Writing Assessment:

This course requires an electronic submission (via Submittable) of an assignment stripped of your personal information to be used for educational research and assessment of the university's writing program. Your paper will be stored in a database. A random selection of

papers will be assessed by a group of faculty and staff using a rubric developed from the following Writing Learning Outcomes:

- Compose written documents that are appropriate for a given audience or purpose
- Formulate and express opinions and ideas in writing
- Use writing to learn and synthesize new concepts
- Revise written work based on constructive feedback
- Find, evaluate, and use information effectively
- Begin to use discipline-specific writing conventions (largely style conventions like APA or MLA)
- Demonstrate appropriate English language usage

This assessment in no way affects either your course grade or your progression at the university. Here's the <u>rubric</u> that will be used to score the papers.

**<u>Requirements for Course</u>**: You are expected to participate. Students will complete all assignments in order to earn credit for the class. Students are expected to keep copies of all assigned work. Students will utilize Moodle at <u>http://umonline.umt.edu/</u> for course syllabus, lectures, assignments, other course materials, announcements, and grades.

## Assignments and Points Distribution:

Ten Critical Thinking Responses: 10 points (100 points total)

Three Papers; Visual Analysis, Interpretation, and Judgment : 100 points each (300 points total)

Art Assignment: 50 points

## Grades are calculated as follows, based on all work completed:
