The University of Montana Department of Foreign Languages will sponsor "International Week" Sunday through Friday, Feb. 23-28, at UM. Films and discussions on several nations will be presented during the week.

Dr. Roman I. Zylawy, assistant professor of foreign languages at UM, coordinator of "International Week," said the purpose of the event is to enable students and townspeople to participate "in a variety of activities dealing with foreign cultures and to discuss the effects of other nations' policies on our daily lives."

"As world leader we have a responsibility to open our minds to the history and traditions of other people, especially if we want them to respect our own culture and ways of doing things," Zylawy said. "A more practical function of International Week will be to give everyone the opportunity to use a foreign language or see it applied in everyday situations."

Nations included in the week's activities are: Brazil, Germany, Russia, Spain, France, Italy and China.

SUNDAY--Brazilian Day. Brazilian film, "Keeper of Promises," 7 p.m. and 9:30 p.m., Room 11, Liberal Arts (LA) Building. Admission, 50 cents. Film discussion moderated by Dr. Stanley L. Rose, assistant professor of foreign languages at UM, 8:30 p.m., LA 11.

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MONDAY--German Day. Free films--"In the Middle of Europe," dealing with German life in the 1970s, and "Europe of Prejudices," 4 p.m., LA 11. Film discussion, 5 p.m., LA 11. Elena Cardas, a professional singer on tour, will present a free public performance at 8 p.m. in the UM Music Recital Hall. Her program, entitled "Satire and Songs of the World," is cosponsored by the UM foreign languages department and the Program Council of the Associated Students of UM.

TUESDAY--Russian Day. Main theme, "Russian Education Today." Free film--"Meet Comrade Student," parts I and II, 7 p.m., LA 11. A discussion comparing the American and Soviet educational systems will follow at 8 p.m.

WEDNESDAY--Hispanic Day. A Spanish songfest will be from 4-5:30 p.m. in the University Center Montana Rooms, 360 A&B. Free film, "Through Spain with Washington Irving," 7 p.m., LA 11. Dr. Theodore H. Shoemaker, professor of foreign languages at UM, will discuss "Alternatives to Franco" following the film.

THURSDAY--French Day. Film, a Fernandel comedy, "The Red Inn," 4 p.m. and 9:15 p.m., LA 11. Admission, 50 cents. A French play, "Rythme a Trois Temps," performed by upper-division French students, will be at 7 p.m. in LA 11. Panel discussion, "Modern France: Political Realities," 7:30-9 p.m., LA 11.

FRIDAY--Italian Day and Chinese Day. Italian portions of the day's events will include a free film, "Renaissance in Italy," 4 p.m., followed by slide presentation, "Contemporary Italy," LA 11. Panel discussion, "Modern Italy: Contrasts," 5 p.m., LA 11. A Chinese-related event will conclude the week's activities.
