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JACK DOTY TO DIRECT MANAGEMENT SEMINARS
IN AFRICAN COUNTRIES FOR 6 WEEKS

MISSOULA--

Dr. Jack H. Doty, professor of management in the University of Montana School of Business Administration, will leave Missoula Sunday, Aug. 17, for a six-week trip to Africa, where he will direct seminars in business management for several African countries.

The trip by Doty--a Fulbright Professor in the Department of Business Administration at the University of Zambia from 1972-74--is being sponsored by the U.S. State Department under a special short-term grant.

The UM professor will first fly to Lusaka, Zambia, where he will be consulting with INDECO, Ltd., a large state-owned holding company comprised of more than 60 firms. He will assist the Zambian company set up a program designed to develop managers. In 1974 Doty directed a three-week executive seminar for INDECO which represented a successful cost-sharing venture between the U.S. and Zambian governments.

Doty will also conduct seminars in Kenya, Lesotho, Botswana and Ethiopia. En route home he will stop at the University of South Africa, Pretoria, to discuss a new training program for black businessmen interested in starting new business ventures in the Republic of South Africa. Doty will return to the UM campus by the beginning of fall quarter Sept. 29.

Doty said business management in Africa is a "crucial problem" because it is difficult to find qualified local managers to replace foreigners who currently hold many of the managerial positions. He said the U.S. is generally recognized as having the most advanced business management practices and is often sought by the developing nations for technical advice. Doty emphasized that Africa is dedicated to progress, both "for the people and nation-building."
