MOOSE JAW OPTIMIST BOYS' CHOIR
TO PERFORM ON UM CAMPUS

The Optimist Boys' Choir, Moose Jaw, Sask., Can., will present a free public concert Tuesday (June 22) at 8 p.m. in the University of Montana Music Recital Hall.

The choir, which is performing in Alberta and Montana during its 10-day tour, consists of 46 boys in seventh grade through high school.

Guest artist traveling with the troupe is Eva Passmore, a 19-year-old lyric soprano from Regina, Sask.

The choir, formed in September 1966, is under the direction of Daryl Pewtress, a member of the Moose Jaw school music staff. Penelope Braaten, a music consultant for Moose Jaw schools, is assistant conductor and accompanist.

The choir's repertoire includes sacred, spiritual, popular, patriotic and folk-rock music. The group also performs highlights of the musical "Oliver" and other selections which feature Miss Passmore.

The Optimist Boys' Choir is performing in Missoula through the efforts of the Missoula Optimist Club and the UM School of Fine Arts.
