HOMAGE TO ALBRECHT DUERER  
(1471-1528) SCHEDULED AT UM

MISSOULA--

Prints of works by a well known German artist, Albrecht Duerer (1471-1528), will be on public display in the Gallery of Visual Arts in Turner Hall at the University of Montana from Nov. 21 through Dec. 10.

Two free public lectures also have been scheduled to commemorate the 500th anniversary of Duerer the man and Duerer the artist.

The first lecture, entitled "Albrecht Duerer As A Man of His Age," will be presented by Dr. Gertrud Lackschewitz of the UM Department of Foreign Languages at noon Nov. 30 in room 305 of the UM Liberal Arts Building. The second lecture, entitled "Albrecht Duerer As A German Renaissance Artist," will be presented by James Dew of the UM Department of Art at noon Dec. 2 in the Gallery of Visual Arts.

The Turner Hall exhibition, entitled "Duerer and His Time," will contain 50 panels, including reproductions of such famous woodcuts as the "Apocalypse," oil portraits, altar paintings and self portraits. The University Library also will exhibit its "Duereriana" in foyer showcases as part of the Duerer display.

Even nonexperts probably know more about Duerer than about any other German artist from the 15th and 16th centuries. "The Praying Hands," reproduced by the millions as prints and in wood, plaster or bronze, and "The Hare" are world famous.

Drawings and documents in the Turner Hall display were provided by the National Museum in Nuremberg, Germany.

Gallery of Visual Arts hours are 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday.
