ALUMNI ASSOCIATION TO DISCUSS ALUMNI COLLEGE CONCEPT

MISSOULA---

A proposal for the formation of an Alumni College will be the featured topic at the University of Montana Alumni Association House of Delegates meeting Friday and Saturday (April 27-28) at UM.

Presenting the proposal for the Alumni College will be Deanna Sheriff, assistant for alumni relations. Sheriff said the Alumni College is a form of continuing education which is usually conducted on campus, advertised at a nominal cost and administered by the University faculty, in some cases for University credit.

"The purpose of the Alumni College is to provide interdisciplinary experiences which motivate alumni to rethink, reflect and respond to the problems and issues which confront everyone after leaving the typical college environment," Sheriff said.

"By organizing an Alumni College the Alumni Association is providing opportunities for alumni to attend and participate in various cultural, recreational and social events as well as stimulating discussion groups."

Making presentations typical of a Alumni College seminar will be Drs. K. Ross Toole, history; David Emmons, history; Warren J. Brier, journalism, and James Lowe, forestry. Also making presentations are Donald C. Miller, journalism, and Laurence Eck, business administration. The Friday (April 27) presentations will range from a description of Montana ghost towns to an overview on forest clearcutting.
