WAR IS THEME OF DISPLAYS
AT U CENTER ART GALLERY

MISSOULA--

Original art by children around the world which expresses their concept of war, and a collection of manuscripts from the American Revolution are now on display at the University of Montana's University Center Art Gallery. The exhibit, which opened Sunday, Jan. 18, will continue through Friday, Jan. 30.

The displays may be viewed in the gallery from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. weekdays and 7-9 p.m. Sunday through Thursday. Leroy Berven is gallery coordinator.

"War Through Children's Eyes" presents children's views of war with startling detail and perceptive insight through various media. The 20 drawings and paintings feature work from children of Vietnam, Israel, Korea and Japan. The exhibition is one of 10 circulated by the Western Association of Art Museums.

"Manuscripts of the American Revolution," a collection of 33 facsimile documents, traces the revolutionary struggle from the Stamp Act crisis of 1765 through war and peace, to George Washington's inauguration as President. The display is circulated by the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service. The documents in the exhibit belong to members of the Manuscript Society.
