HAINES, DUFFIELD READINGS
SET FOR WEDNESDAY AT UM

MISSOULA--

John Haines and Dr. John W. Duffield will read from their poetry and fiction at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 25, in the Gallery of Visual Arts in Turner Hall at the University of Montana.

Haines, who was a visiting lecturer in English at UM last year, will read several of his poems and a short story entitled "Moments and Journeys." The short story has been published in "CutBank," a UM literary magazine. Haines also is author of several collections of poems, including "Winter News" and "Leaves and Ashes."

Duffield, an assistant professor of economics at UM, is now exhibiting his sculpture work with Haines' photography in the Gallery of Visual Arts, which is open from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m. weekdays.

In conjunction with free public readings Wednesday nights in the Gallery of Visual Arts, KUFM, the public radio station at UM, broadcasts recorded readings by Missoula writers at midnight Thursdays.
