INTERNATIONAL ECOLOGY LECTURES TO BEGIN MONDAY, MARCH 1, AT UM

#### MISSOULA--

Dr. Meyer Chessin, professor of botany at the University of Montana, has scheduled four programs on the theme, "International Aspects of Environmental Quality," beginning Monday, March 1, at UM.

The free public lectures are part of a series of programs sponsored by the UM Department of Botany in conjunction with a University course entitled "Current Environmental Problems."

Chessin's four lectures will be held at noon on Monday, March 1; Wednesday, March 3; Monday, March 8, and Wednesday, March 10, in room 307 of the UM Natural Science Building.

The lectures will be accompanied with color slides which Chessin took during his travels to Europe and Israel.

"The slides illustrate how different countries with different social systems, and different historical backgrounds and geographical settings approach solutions to such environmental problems as air and water pollution, urbanization, industrialization, agricultural practices, land use and clear-cutting," Chessin said.

Chessin is the coordinator of the "Current Environmental Problems" course at UM.
