CINDY PRICE TO DISCUSS 'SKI YELLOWSTONE'
AT PUBLIC FORUM TUESDAY, MAR. 9, AT UNIVERSITY

MISSOULA--

Cindy Price, author of the ski column entitled "Skimania," will speak on the "Ski Yellowstone" proposal Tuesday, March 9, at 8 p.m. in the University Center Lounge at the University of Montana in Missoula.

"Ski Yellowstone," a winter resort planned for construction on Hebgen Mountain, north of Hebgen Lake near West Yellowstone, is the subject of a controversy between developers and environmentalists.

According to a press release from the University Center Programming Services office at UM, Price, a member of the U.S. Ski Writer Association, says that the "Ski Yellowstone" proposal has been the victim of unwarranted opposition.

Tuesday's program is open to the public without charge. The discussion is one in a series of public forums sponsored by UC Programming Services.
