INSTITUTE, 2 CLASSES IN HOME ECONOMICS
SET JUNE 14-18 AT UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA

MISSOULA--

The "Institute for Supervising Teachers in Home Economics" and two extension courses in home economics will be presented at the University of Montana in Missoula during the 1976 UM Summer Pre-Session Monday through Friday, June 14-18.

The extension courses, entitled "Food Preservation" and "200 Years of Household Chemistry," will be offered for two credits each.

Sixty secondary school teachers will participate in the "Institute for Supervising Teachers in Home Economics." Objectives of the institute are to review selection, outcomes and grading of student teachers and to increase confidence and effectiveness of supervisors.

Invited participants are the supervising teachers for the home economics programs at UM and Montana State University, Bozeman.

A highlight of the institute will be a panel discussion on the topic, "Clarification of policies and Procedures." The discussion will be at 9 a.m. Wednesday, June 16, in room 204 of the UM Women's Center. Panelists will include Dr. Robert H. Jay, director of student teaching and professor of education at UM, and Dr. Robert Van Woert, director of student teaching and certification at MSU.

Dr. Ruth Brasher, professor of home economics education at Brigham Young University, Provo, Utah, will be the institute consultant.

Dr. Forrest D. Thomas, professor of chemistry at UM, will teach the course, "200 Years of Household Chemistry," from 8:40 a.m.-noon Monday through Friday in room 102 of the UM Chemistry-Pharmacy Building.

Discussions during the course will include the impact of industry and consumer use of chemicals on the environment, and the social and economic factors involved.

The course on food preservation will be from 1:20-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday in room 220 of the UM Women's Center. Jeannette T. Hiett, assistant professor of home economics at UM, will teach the course.

Food preservation techniques discussed during the five-day course will include freezing, canning, drying, pickling and fermenting. Selection of equipment, storage of food products and safety in food preservation also will be discussed.
