A series of discussions dealing with a variety of topics will be included in the fourth annual University of Montana Alumni College from Friday-Sunday, July 30-Aug. 1, at the Lubrecht Forestry Camp, 30 miles northeast of Missoula.

Opening registration will be at 10 a.m. Friday. The program, designed for UM alumni and their spouses, parents of University students and the general public, continues until 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Dr. Harry W. Fritz, associate professor of history at UM, will discuss the UM Alumni College theme, "Where Do We Go From Here?", at 1 p.m. Friday, following a noon luncheon at Lubrecht. UM Alumni College Director Deanna Sheriff will present welcoming remarks at the luncheon.
