'INDIAN PRIDE ON THE MOVE' EXHIBIT
TO BE SHOWN IN DEER LODGE AUG. 10 AND 12

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MISSOULA--

A traveling exhibit entitled "Indian Pride on the Move," which is being presented in various communities across the nation through December of this year under the sponsorship of the National Park Service in cooperation with the University of Montana, Missoula, will be open to the public without charge at the Grant-Kohrs Ranch National Historic Site, Deer Lodge, Tuesday and Thursday, Aug. 10 and 12.

The exhibit will be open at the Grant-Kohrs facility from 9:30 a.m. to dusk Aug. 10 and 12. Following the exhibit each night there will be a free public program of films or illustrated talks presented in the Grant-Kohrs Ranch parking lot at the "Indian Pride on the Move" exhibit.

Dr. Joel H. Bernstein, associate professor of art history, who is director of the traveling project, said the exhibit, which was never seen by the public until the show went on the road in July, includes about 110 pieces of historically valuable antique items dating from about 1850 to 1925. Items in the display, housed in a 40-foot trailer, are from the David T. Vernon Collection of Native American Arts.

Vernon is credited with establishing his collection over most of his life by obtaining items for the exhibit from the plains, woodlands and plateau areas of the U.S.

Included in the display are various examples of Indian clothing such as moccasins and leggings, smoking pipes, blankets, bear claw necklaces, pouches and bags, and spoons and ladles.

Rosella Red Wolf Covington, former project director for the Native American Cultural Institute at UM, is field supervisor for the traveling exhibit.
