AT UNIVERSITY FRIDAY, OCT. 8

Antoinette Rosell, Republican candidate for state lieutenant governor, will speak and answer questions during a "Forum '76" program at noon Friday, Oct. 8, in the University Center Mall at the University of Montana.

The public is invited to attend Rosell's speech and to ask questions concerning political issues in Montana.

Rosell is the running mate of Robert Woodahl, Republican candidate for governor and current attorney general of Montana. She is presently a guidance counselor at Lincoln and Junior High School in Billings,^{and} is a state senator from Yellowstone County. Rosell has served on several state and national legislative committees since 1963. She serves on the 21-member National Advisory Council on Economic Opportunity, which advises President Gerald R. Ford on the review of current national efforts to alleviate poverty.

Rosell received the bachelor of arts degree from UM in 1948 and the master of arts degree from Columbia University Teachers College, New York, N.Y., in 1952.
