FESTIVAL PROGRAM INCLUDES EXHIBITS

The Montana Fine Arts Festival-18th Century- will include exhibits of prints, manuscripts and memorabilia of the era, according to Dean Charles W. Bolen of the University of Montana School of Fine Arts.

Eighteenth-century prints will be on display in room 205 of the Music building for the entire period of the festival, May 9-29. The collection, containing works by such major artists as Boucher, Hogarth and Piranesi, was compiled by Dr. Joan Smith of the art faculty. Lenders to the exhibition are Dr. and Mrs. Vedder M. Gilbert, Missoula; the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, N. Y., and the UM Art Department. The exhibit is sponsored by the Associated Students of the University of Montana.

ASUM will also sponsor "18th-Century Showcase," an exhibit of music history from primary sources. The contents are from the Moldenhauer Archive, Spokane, Wash., and Dr. Hans Moldenhauer will be on Campus to lecture on the exhibit, which will be shown in room 205 of the Music building Sunday and Monday, May 15 and 16. Composers represented include Ludwig van Beethoven, Joseph Haydn and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart.

Books, manuscripts and other materials related to the 18th century will be on view in the University Library May 9-29. The exhibit is sponsored by the library and compiled by Suzanne Ward, assistant reference librarian.
