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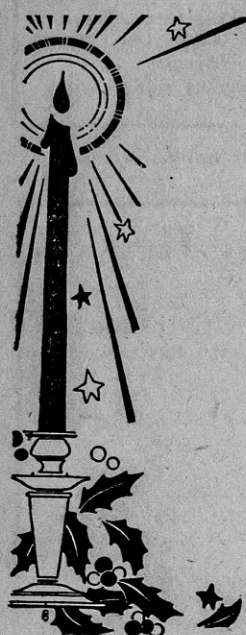
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WAA Honors Seventy-eight Women At Fireside; Announces All-Star Teams

Dance, 'Snow Maiden,' 'Rodeo' at 2nd Concert Of Current Season

Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo, which will appear on the Student Union Stage at 8:15 o'clock, Wednesday, will be the second program in the Community Concert series, according to Ralph Gildroy, Billings, student chairman.

All students wishing to attend the ballet may do so by presenting their activity tickets at the door instead of the custom used formerly of exchanging activity tickets for concert tickets beforehand.

As their opening number, the ballet will dance the well-known "Snow Maiden" story of the daughter of Father Frost and Mother Spring. It will be laid in two scenes, both in a country village during the last of winter, with Nathalie Crassovska in the title role of Snow Maiden and Igor Youskevitch as Lell, the legendary shepherd boy.

After intermission, the dancing changes tempo to life on a ranch in the "Rodeo" or "The Courting at Burnt Ranch" by Agnes de Mille. This act, in two scenes, is laid on a ranch in the Southwest

At the right: John Lester, associate professor of music, who will direct the University Mixed Chorus in their annual presentation of "The Messiah."

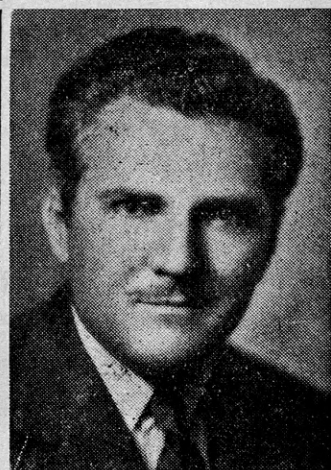
and chorus stands while it is being sung. This custom can be dated back to the first performance in Italy when the king was so impressed by the music that he stood up and the entire audience did likewise and remained standing during the entire chorus.

Smith Starts Presentation

Started by DeLoss Smith, dean of the music school from 1913 to 1939, the presentation of certain parts of the "Messiah" has become a traditional Christmas presentation on the campus. The entire first part of the oratorio, the first chorus of the second part, "Behold the Lamb of God," and the "Hallelujah Chorus" will be sung during the program. "His Yoke is Easy," one of the choruses, was not sung last year but has been added to this year's program.

Mrs. Florence Smith, professor of organ, will accompany the chorus at the organ and Rudolph Wendt, instructor of piano, will be at the piano.

Certain parts of the "Messiah," particularly the "Hallelujah Chorus" will be recorded and sent to the radio stations throughout Montana, Lester said.



Associates Appointed

Publications Board yesterday appointed Shirley Calnan, Valley City, N.D., Neal Rasmussen, Missoula, and Bob Sias, Chinook, as associate editors of the 1943 Sentinel.

Curtailment of the budget has caused many changes in this year's Sentinel, according to Editor Aline Mosby, Missoula. "The layout of the new Sentinel will be entirely different from any plan previously used on this campus," she stated.

The size of the book will be reduced from 9 inches by 12 inches to 8½ inches by 11 inches, due to the slashed budget, the editor said. The book will be lithographed instead of printed as in former years.

Dr. Thomas, after explaining briefly the significance of PASF, introduced Chapter-President Bill Hanson, Bowman, N.D., and presented him with the president's gavel. Introductions of the officers and section officers followed, gavels being given to the International Relations section vice-president, Warren Peterson, Helena, and to the Spanish section vice-president, Virginia McCabe, Billings.

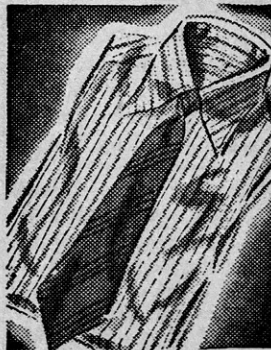
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Utah Team Plays Here In First Tilt

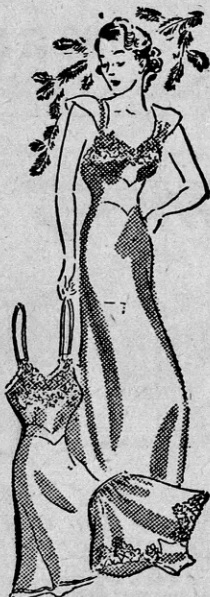
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DYKSTRA GETS GOLD BARS

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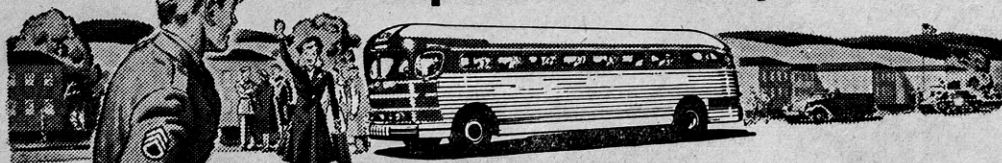
