OREGON PROFESSOR TO SPEAK MONDAY ON "THE DIVINE COMEDY"

University of Montana summer quarter visiting professor Chandler B. Beall will speak next Monday (July 18) at 8 p.m. in Liberal Arts 103.

Dr. Beall, professor of romance languages at the University of Oregon, will discuss "The Divine Comedy and Tradition." The speech is open to the public at no charge. Beall is teaching "Studies in Comparative Literature" at the University.

Dr. Beall received a BA and Ph.D. degree from Johns Hopkins University. He has studied in France, Italy, Mexico and Spain.

He has written numerous books and articles dealing with the romance languages and authors.

Dr. Beall is editor of the quarterly "Comparative Literature" official publication of the American Comparative Literature Association and member of the executive council of the Modern Language Association.

He has taught at the University of South Carolina, Johns Hopkins, George Washington, Princeton, Tulane, North Carolina and the University of Oregon.
