Very true Mr. Khayyam. The students of MSU have chosen to spend the flower of their lives in college. The Victorian regulations that limit their enjoyment of life must be revised.

With only a few weeks of school remaining there is little we can do toward realizing this, one of our most cherished goals, i.e., to quote from our announced policy, "More liberty for women students. The abolition of rigid supervision. The eradication of suspicion." There is however much that you can do during the summer vacation that will make our task easier next fall.

When you are home this summer consult your parents, relatives, friends. Explain to them the system by which your morals and personal life are regulated here at the university. See what they think about letting you stay out until at least 1 a.m. on week-end nights. See if they mind if you go out of the city limits without the written permission of the dean of women. Ask them if they think chaperones at fraternity parties should have to possess the rigid qualities that chaperones at present must have. Find out how they feel on the question of not permitting freshmen women downtown before four o'clock in the afternoon. Feel them out on any point that you deem unreasonable. Ask them to write the board of education or the president of the university, anyone who has authority to bend the policy of the dean's office, and express themselves on these questions.

By doing this we shall have taken the first step in an orderly program designed to bring our moral rulebook up to date.

Some three days before the meet began several students appeared at Central Board requesting that something be done to provide entertainment. No one knew the setup and a state of general confusion reigned.

The whole situation might have been avoided had the students been informed in advance of the facts. In the future they shall be. The Kaimin will see to that.

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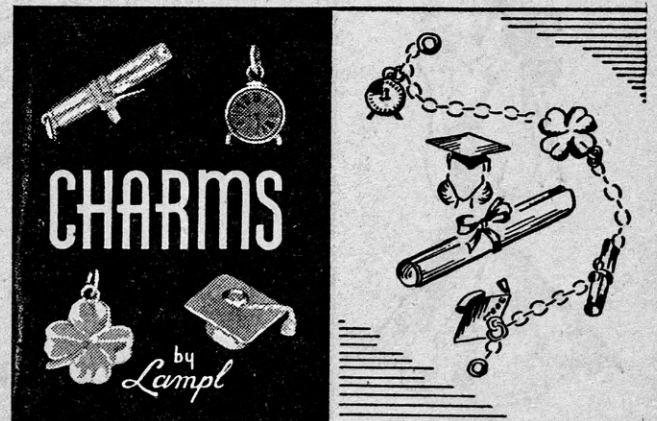
