UM STUDENT ONE OF TWO WINNERS OF REGIONAL FORESTRY AWARDS

MISSOULA --

Jim Woods, a senior in the School of Forestry at the University of Montana, has received a \$700 scholarship from the Forest Clinic Foundation.

The foundation gives two scholarships annually to students selected from the six forestry schools in the Pacific Northwest. The awards are made on the basis of scholarship, aptitude and the recommendation of the school.

Woods, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Herb Woods of Castlegar, B.C., majors in forest resource management at the UM.

The other scholarship winner is James Spicer, a student at the University of Idaho.

The Forest Clinic Foundation is sponsored by the Northwest Wood Products Clinic and the Inland Empire Section of the Forest Products Research Society, who support an annual clinic to promote better utilization of wood by existing industries and develop new uses for wood.

Prof. Leo K. Cummins, who teaches courses in forest products and timber harvesting at the UM, said the foundation provides an opportunity for interested individuals to meet regularly to discuss equipment, raw materials, production marketing and other topics of common concern.

Cummins said the foundation also serves as a medium of distribution of information on wood utilization.
