UM'S PANTZER TO GIVE TELEVISION REPORT

North and central Montanans will receive a first-hand television report on the state of their University Thursday (Sept. 29) morning from Robert T. Pantzer, acting president of the University of Montana in Missoula.

President Pantzer will be interviewed on Norma Ashby's award-winning "Today in Montana" show over KRTV, Great Falls, from 8-8:30 a.m.

He is expected to present detailed examination of the present growth of the University and physical plant plans and needs, complete with film scenes and other illustrations.

He also is expected to comment on such issues as Referendum 64, which is proposed to continue the three cent cigarette tax for a building program for Montana's public institutions, including the University system, and salary requirements to attract and retain excellent faculty at the University.

President and Mrs. Pantzer will travel to Great Falls on Wednesday (Sept. 28), to meet with Great Falls UM Alumni at a no-host dinner at 6 p.m. in the India Room of Schell's Town House.

He will discuss informally with alumni the University, its current status and plans for its future, as well as 1966 Homecoming plans.
