GREBELDINGER AND WYNNE  
ASSIST INCOMING FRESHMEN

MISSOULA--

Sue Grebeldinger, Glendive, and Tom Wynne, Havre, members of the University of Montana Advocates, a student service organization that promotes the University, assisted new UM students at summer orientation in Missoula July 23 to 25.

Orientation is designed to acquaint new students with the University and help prepare them for college life. This year, 225 students and 57 parents attended the two-day program.

"Orientation is the best way to get to know the University," Grebeldinger said. "It's a very personalized couple of days and you get a better feel, academically and socially, for what the University has to offer."

During orientation students meet with faculty advisers, learn about UM classes, take placement tests and meet UM personnel as well as some of their fellow classmates.

Grebeldinger, a senior in political science and Latin, carries a 4.0 grade-point average. She serves on the University's legislative committee, the academic standards and curriculum review committee and this year will also be the lecture coordinator for the student programming office.

Grebeldinger was one of 24 UM students to receive a \$1,000 Watkins Scholarship to complete a thesis during her senior year. Her thesis was titled "Aspects of Soviet International Law." She is studying Russian and plans to attend law school following graduation.

Wynne has been active in advocates for two years and is a junior in business. He transferred to the University from Northern Montana College in Havre and after graduating he hopes to work for a corporation in either accounting or finance.
