AMES MEMORIAL AWARD GIVEN TO ROSS IVERSON, UM STUDENT

The Walter R. Ames Memorial Award was awarded recently to Ross L. Iverson of Marshalltown, Iowa. The \$150 award is given annually to a UM graduate student studying at the doctoral level in education.

The award was established by Walter R. Ames, UM education professor from 1919-1955, to encourage students to pursue doctoral degrees in education.

Iverson received his bachelor's degree from the University of Northern Iowa (UNI), Cedar Falls, and his master's from the University of Northern Colorado, Greeley, in 1965 and 1969, respectively.

He has taught at the lowa Teachers Camp at UNI and has presented papers to conventions of the National Science Teachers Association and to the lowa Academy of Science.

Judges for the Ames award were: Dr. James E. Short, president of Western Montana College, <u>Dillon</u>; Dr. Linus Carlton, emeritus professor of education at UM; Elaine White, emeritus assistant professor of education at UM; and Dr. George Millis, professor of education at UM.
