BRASS AND PERCUSSION  
RECITAL IS WEDNESDAY

The 23-member University Brass and Percussion Ensemble, assisted by a dozen additional instrumentalists, will present a recital Wednesday (Jan. 25) at 8:15 p.m. in the University of Montana Recital Hall, according to Laurence Perry, who heads the Music Department.

Robert E. Bailey, graduate assistant in music from Northfield, Minn., is director of the ensemble.

The program includes "Three Diverse Pieces for Winds" by Dr. Donald O. Johnston of the UM faculty and two works by Vaclav Nelhybel, Czech composer, who guest conducted the UM Band twice in the past year.

Other composers represented are Giovanni Gabrieli, Frank Bencriscutto, Melchior Franck, William Presser, Anatol Liadov, Alexander Glazunov, Claude Debussy, Alan Shulman, Albert Roussel and Meredith Willson.

The recital is open to the public without charge, Perry said.
