Excerpts from the off-Broadway production of "An Evening's Frost" will be presented by artist-in-residence Donald Davis in the UM Music Recital Hall Wednesday at 4 p.m.

Mr. Davis will read poetry and prose selections from the works of Robert Frost as they were presented in last year's New York production in which he appeared as a principal player.

The readings will be open to the public without charge.

Mr. Davis has just completed a run in "Elizabeth, the Queen" at the New York Civic Center. He was a member of the Broadway company of "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" and has appeared on national television and several other plays in New York and Canada.

Mr. Davis will star as Creon in the Masquer production of "Antignone," which will play in the University Theater Feb. 9-12.

His three-week stay at UM is sponsored by the Department of Drama and the ASUM Program Council.
