ART CLASSES PLANNED FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

A 10-week art enrichment program for fourth, fifth and sixth graders will be offered by the University of Montana and Missoula School District No. 1, beginning February 11, it was announced Thursday (Feb. 2) by Richard B. Reinholtz, chairman of the UM Art Department, and Mrs. Diane Bodholt, district 1 art director.

The art classes will meet on Saturdays from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. The first session is scheduled February 11 at 9:30 a.m. in room 404E of the UM Fine Arts building.

Areas covered by the classes include clay, paper mache, printmaking, painting, drawing, sculpture and native materials.

Instruction is free, but a fee of 50¢ per session will be charged to cover cost of materials. The total \$5 fee is payable at the first session.

Parents interested in enrolling their children in the classes may obtain details of the program from Reinholtz or Mrs. Bodholt.
