The News in Brief National and Collegiate

University of Idaho — Senior women were routed out of bed Sunday night last week by a phone call, and asked to report for a song practice. When they convened they learned that the practice was only a bad dream. Only the senior women at Kappa Alpha Theta failed to appear for the nocturnal rehearsal. Outsiders are wondering if the fact that the senior week chairman is a Theta has any special significance.

Oregon State College — The Daily Barometer swallowed its pride recently admitted that the Oregon Journal wasn't far wrong when it chastised OSC for a recent student election to pass judgment on a new constitution. Only 1,400 of 7,000 students went to the polls. "What good lies in learning if one cannot learn to govern himself," the Barometer asks.

Washington — Dalton Trumbo, script writer for "Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo," saw his contempt trial postponed yesterday when Parnell Thomas, recent star of the Hollywood anti-Communist probe, indicated he would not be available as a witness from the House Un-American Activities committee.

Colorado A & M — The city manager of Fort Collins is on the spot these days, explaining loud and long how it was that two ex-GI students at the college were refused permission to operate a concession at the city softball grounds. The men went to school for one year on the money they made at the ball park last year. "The city takes care of its ex-GI's," City Manager Palmes said. He added that one of the vets had been rude to him, and said, "He had no right to be rude to an old man."

Work Is Assigned To Operetta Crew

Chicago — Friction between railroad operators and union officials, supposedly put to rights during a 30-day cooling-off period that ended last night, has not eased off. This was the opinion of union officials yesterday. From today on, 150,000 engineers, firemen, and switchmen can legally strike at any time—and if they do the nation's railroads will be tied up.

Washington — Fond hopes that John L. Lewis will be idle for a long time while he ponders his recent reverses in the courts may be premature. His contracts with the soft coal industry expire June 30. If Lewis decides to threaten a summer strike he can, under the Taft-Hartley law, announce now that he will discontinue the contract. He will then be free to move at the end of a 60-day period.

Washington — The long-awaited battle-royal between the oleomargarine and butter forces began yesterday with what appears to be a victory for the former. The House started consideration of a bill to end all federal taxes on oleo, and while this was going on, approved a motion to take away from the House agricultural committee any further jurisdiction over the controversial legislation.

Traditional Cleanup Day Features Work, Voting; Additional Events Planned

The stage has been set for Aber Day, one of Montana's oldest campus traditions, and John Holding, manager for the cleanup event ended his final checkup of activities by stating it would be one of the best Aber days if the students cooperate in all the events.

Holding's plans include many additions to the original old fashioned Aber day. He has streamlined it to include ball games between faculty and students, barbecues, and the awarding of trophies and prizes for winners in various races and special events that will be announced on "A" day.

Competition Looms

Injection of the old competitive spirit was added when Aber day heads decided to put the cleanup activities on a point basis, each group being judged by a committee as to the quality of the work in their particular assigned area. The judging committee for the areas include ten students and one faculty member and trophies will be awarded for the outstanding cleanup.

Several other important points in the "A" day functions have been altered for the better. Previously, students up for offices in the primary were not allowed on the campus until 3 o'clock. This rule has been modified, Holding stated, to the effect that students can be on the campus to take part in the activities but they will not be allowed in the voting area.

For Pie Eaters

The pie eating contest scheduled for 1 o'clock will be open to one person from each organization. Holding interpreted this statement to mean that each club, social organization, and living group could enter one contestant. Two separate contests are slated, one for the women and one for the men.

Election Rules

Here are the Aber day voting regulations that must be observed. Dave Freeman, Missoula, election chairman, warned this morning.

According to Article VII, ASMSU constitution, "Electioneering shall be prohibited at the polling places. . .

Each voter must show his ASMSU card as identification before being permitted to vote, and cards shall be checked with names on the voting roster."

1. Polls open at 11 a.m., close at 3 p.m.

2. Candidates may be on the campus, but must not appear in the polling area except to vote.

3. All political signs and advertisements must be off the oval on Aber day.

Voting will take place on the east end of the oval.

Dear Editor:

Rerefering to your article, "Kappa Sigs, Co-op Lead Grade Index" in Wednesday's Kaimin, I would like to question the statement, "In the over-all picture, men students have a higher grade index than the women students." Your article goes on to point out that the Kappa Sigs led with 1.734, and all university men with 1.310. On the other side we have the Women's Co-op with 1.559, and all university women with 1.409.

Grizzly Trackmen Nip Cheney On Strength of Relay Victory

Yovetich Cops Both Hurdle Events to Pace Montana as Domke, Doyle, Mayes, Graham Win Firsts; Bad Weather Slows Meet

Montana was hard pressed in squeezing out a 67 2-5 to 63 3-5 track and field win over the Eastern Washington Savages Saturday afternoon at Cheney.

Going into the last event, the mile relay, the Grizzlies were two-fifths of a point behind. But the relay team of McLatchy, Domke, Stell, and Gray pulled the meet out of the fire.

Eastern Washington took nine

first places. Dan Yovetich won both the high and low hurdles and led the Grizzly scoring with 10 points.

The big surprise of the day was the performance turned in by Jim Graham in the javelin event. Participating for the first time in college competition, Graham took first place with a heave of 167' 5".

Bad weather prevailed during the meet. Rain fell during most of the events, competitors had to cope with a strong wind, and the weather was cold.

Bob Holding turned in one of the best pitching performances of the season as he shut out Northern Idaho 10-0, on seven hits. Ted Tabarracci poled a home run in the third with John Holding aboard.
