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## Red Cross President Speaks at Convocation At 11:10 This Morning

Basil O'Connor, president of the American Red Cross, will speak at the convocation this morning at 11:10. The program will also include 15 minutes of light comedy music by the Sinfonian quartette.

O'Connor, a former law partner of Pres. Roosevelt up until the 1932 election, was appointed as chairman of the Red Cross by the late President in 1944.

After serving nearly three years as chairman of the Red Cross, O'Connor was appointed president of the organization for a 3-year term by President Harry S. Truman on May 8, 1948.

In 1948 O'Connor headed both the American Red Cross and the United States government delegations to the 17th International Red Cross conference at Stockholm, Sweden. On this occasion he was awarded numerous medals by King Frederick of Denmark. He is also a Commander in the French Legion of Honor, and holds many medals of merit from foreign Red Cross groups.

In May, 1948, in recognition of his humanitarian services, O'Connor was awarded the gold medal of the National Institute of Social Sciences. He is a member of the President's Committee on Religious and Moral Welfare and Character Guidance in the Armed Forces.

Head of the two largest humanitarian organizations in the country, O'Connor is president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and president of the Red Cross, serving in both as an unpaid volunteer.

O'Connor is known for his gift of repartee and ability as an extemporaneous speaker. His friends say he is a prodigious worker, usually limiting himself to six hours' sleep. His hobby is farming at his Westhampton Beach, L. I., place. He also collects first editions of new American authors.

He will also speak to over 400 luncheon club members in Missoula this noon. The public lunch-

eon will be at 12:15 p.m. at the Hotel Florence. Several Red Cross officials will attend this meeting.

Leaving New York City February 1, O'Connor made his first stop Friday and Saturday at Salt Lake City. He will go from Missoula to Chicago and then to Texas.

### ZeZula Elected Jumbo Chief

Jumbo's second run-off election gave Cecil ZeZula, Whitehall, an 86-vote margin over Dan Marinkovich, Anaconda, for hall president. ZeZula received 191 votes to 105 for Marinkovich.

The final election, brought about after the first run-off when Marinkovich protested the counting of four late votes, had the lowest turn-out of the three elections.

In the vice presidential race, Taino Kauhanen, Butte, defeated Jerry Levine, Poplar, by garnering 198 ballots to 86. Other hall positions, decided in the first-round voting by decisive margins or lack of opposition, were not included in the run-off.

The final balloting was conducted in the main lounge and each man voting had his name checked off before casting his ballot. Previously the voting had been conducted by wing representatives.

### New Hall Is Temporary Health Center

Because of the measles epidemic the health service has been temporarily shifted to New hall, according to Dr. C. R. Lyons, health service director. The health service building will be open only between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. on weekdays and from 9 a.m. till 12 a.m. on Saturdays.

Two emergency infirmaries have been set up in the basement of New hall for women and in South hall for men. Health service staff nurses are on duty 24 hours a day. Dr. Lyons said that for probably two more weeks the health service will be operated by the two doctors and one nurse. They will handle the usual daily calls from 9 a.m. till 4 p.m.

In case of evening emergencies Dr. Lyons said to call the nurse on duty in New hall basement. Between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. those needing medical aid may call 7626. One of the doctors will be on the usual 24-hour call.

According to Dr. Lyons 45 measles cases have been reported so far.

## Water Supply Normal Again

"We have the water situation cleared up now," Tom Swearingen said yesterday.

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## Newspapers Outdated

Some weeks ago Dr. Robert Hutchins, chancellor of the University of Chicago, had a chance to defend the report of the Commission on the freedom of the press before the national conference of editorial writers. Doctor Hutchins had a legitimate defense.

The commission's report was made in March 1947 after three years of study at a cost of \$215,000. The commission members consisted of 13 prominent men, mostly university professors, in the fields of philosophy, political science, communications, theology, law, and history.

The major conclusion reached by the commission was that freedom of the press was in danger—mostly from the press itself. Any number of publishers and editors didn't like the report—many papers made no comment at all because the commission's report hit too close to home.

Needless to say, Doctor Hutchins' talk before the editorial writers didn't get much favorable attention from the press. Some of his speech appeared in one nationally-known newspaper magazine but most of the direct quotes were deleted. Regardless of the press treatment he received, the fact cannot be disguised that many papers today are not recognizing their public responsibilities nor are they obviating governmental action to enforce them.

The day should come when the press will use every means that can be devised to increase the competence, independence, and effectiveness of its staffs. We should also see a day when the press becomes analogous to the universities and their duty toward public enlightenment for what is the press if it isn't an organ of instruction and enlightenment?

Many papers today, and a number within our own state, are not meeting these public needs because they are throttled by the balance sheet and the more serious hazards of the personal, social, political, and economic prejudices of the owner, corporation, or company that controls them.

When some of the larger dailies in this state operate in the tradition that is necessary for good teaching, then, and only then, will be able to accept them as teachers.

"To have pupils, public confidence must be established," Doctor Hutchins said. It couldn't have been said better, Doc.—P. A. H.

Montana's basketball squad chalked up its fourth straight victory last night with a 76-59 victory over Whitman college's Missionaries at Walla Walla, Wash. The two teams meet again tonight.

The four-game victory skein is the longest the Grizzlies have accumulated this year. The triumph brought their season wins to nine, as against 11 setbacks.

The Grizzlies' irrepressible forward, Bob Cope, worked his famous hook shot for 12 baskets and a total of 26 points to lead Montana's offensive attack. Whitman's defense was unable to stop the high-scoring Grizzly.

Whitman jumped to an early 5-0 lead but the Grizzlies found the range after five minutes, forged ahead and assumed a commanding 40-22 halftime advantage. In the second period, Whitman's Anderson scored five baskets to spearhead a Missionary rally that brought his team within three points of Montana, 50 to 53.

The Whits captured numerous rebounds off both backboards to keep the rally alive. But midway in the second period Montana regained the upper hand and held it until the final gun.

# Coaching Candidate To Arrive Today

Carnie H. Smith, head coach at Santa Rosa, Calif., Junior college, will arrive in Missoula this afternoon to be interviewed for the head Grizzly football coaching job by the university's faculty-student athletic committee.

Smith is one of the many candidates for the Grizzly coaching job who has been interviewed by Dr. J. Earll (Burly) Miller, chairman of the athletic committee, who is now on leave in California, and Clyde W. "Cac" Hubbard, newly appointed director of athletics. He formerly was a member of Lynn A. (Pappy) Waldorf's coaching staff and has enthusiastic recommendations from the California mentor.

He is a 1933 graduate of the University of Kansas, where he played for the Jayhawks during the seasons of 1930, 1931 and 1932 and was named quarterback on the mythical all-Big Six conference team in 1930. He was on the last Jayhawk team to win the Big Six championship before Coach George Sauer, now at the naval academy, turned the trick again in 1947.

### Impressive Record

After graduation he coached at two small Kansas high schools, finally going to Paola, Kansas, in 1935. Here his football teams went undefeated from 1937 to 1940. With the outbreak of the war, he enlisted in the navy, where he rose to the rank of lieutenant (senior grade).

After honorable discharge in 1946, Smith went to Parsons (Kan.) Junior college as head coach for a year before joining the University of California staff in 1947. He assisted Waldorf during the fall of 1947 and the spring

of 1948, and took over as head coach at Santa Rosa last year. There, in his first year of coaching, he finished second in the Northern California junior college league and his team was chosen to meet Everett (Wash.) Junior college in the annual Redwood bowl game. He won the junior college classic, 14 to 6.

### MA Degree

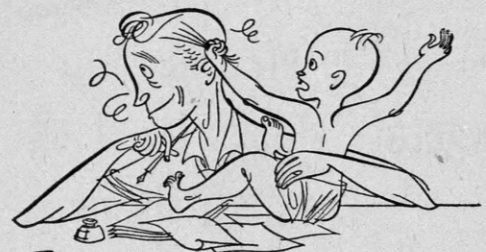
Smith holds a bachelor of science degree from the University of Kansas and a master of arts degree from the University of California. He is 38 years old.

The Santa Rosa mentor will make initial contacts with university athletic officials this afternoon and meet the entire athletic committee at a dinner in the Student Union building tonight.

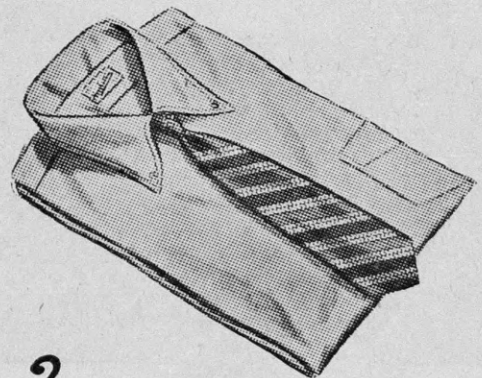
